GARCIA GROWS WORSE.

Criminal Hybrid May Die in Seattle.
Sullivan May Not Appeal.

According to a telegram received from Sheriff Emery, Joe Garcia, the alleged slayer of Police Officer Ford, is in a critical condition in a hospital at Seattle. Garcia's wounds, inflicted by Seattle police officers while he was resisting arrest Wednesday night, seem to be more serious than was supposed. Sheriff Emery said he had been told a few days ago that Garcia recovers Emery will remain there until the man is able to travel and then he will be brought back to this city and placed on trial for complicity in the murder of Officer Ford. If the man dies, he will undoubtedly be buried in Seattle, unless relatives demand his body. There is still considerable speculation as to who led Garcia into the trap, but officers who are in a position to know say that "Tip" Barker is the man who betrayed the Chinese-Mexican. Yesterday afternoon Atty. J. H. Bailey, Jr., of Sullivan's counsel, called at the state prison and had a long conference with the governor, who stated to state what they talked about, but it is understood that a fight will not be made for a new trial.

RAILWAY MUST PAY

David Lindsay was yesterday given judgment against the Oregon Short Line Railroad company for the loss of his suit case and articles contained therein in the sum of \$20.50 by a jury in Judge Lewis' division of the Third district court. The case came up on appeal from the decision of the court, where a decision had been given in favor of the company. Lindsay claimed he had sent the grip to the station by an expressman and that the company did not take care of it and it was lost.

IDAHO WOMAN'S MOTOR CAR TRIP

Mrs. Teape and Daughter, Mrs. MacKellie of Sand Point To Undertake It.

FROM ATLANTIC TO PACIFIC.

Will Leave Portland, Maine, Next Week for Portland, Oregon, Via Boston, Omaha and Salt Lake.

In the last three or four years, several trans-continental trips have been attempted, and some successfully made by automobilists, but it remained for Mrs. E. E. Teape and Mrs. Vera MacKellie of Sand Point, Idaho, to be the first women motorists to attempt the 4,000 miles from the Atlantic to the Pacific. On May 14, starting at Portland, Maine, Mrs. Teape and her daughter, Mrs. MacKellie, driving an 8 horsepower, two-cylinder runabout will attempt to cross the continent to Portland, Oregon. The trip is to be made alone, unhampered by drivers, chauffeurs or luggage other than the necessary wearing apparel, and is to be made in easy stages, by the way of Boston, Albany, Buffalo, Chicago, Des Moines, Omaha, Cheyenne, Salt Lake City, Ogden, Boise, Baker City, to Portland.

It is the longest trip ever attempted by a woman motorist and Mrs. Teape who is now in New York arranging for the details of the trip, is fully confident of being able to not only successfully complete the tour as originally mapped out, but is allowing herself only eight weeks in which to do it.

Efforts made by the cars in the recent New York-to-Paris race to make time, however in two weeks time, it not only the same bread that goes into so many thousands of Salt Lake homes.
