The amount of the contract is not given out, but it is a large one, and provides for the work being commenced as seen as possible and pushed with all possible speed to completion.

General Manager W. H. Wattis of the Construction company returned home yesterday to fix up the contract and to organize and get the grading with in readiness to go right ahead with the work.
