The Utah Western Railway will run an excursion train to Lake Point on the 1st of May, leaving Salt Lake City at 9 o'clock a. m., and returning, leaving Lake Point at 3 o'clock p. m., arriving in Salt Lake City at 4:15 p. m. Fare for the round trip, 60 cents; children under 10 years of age, 30 cents.

On the 1st of May the regular train on the Utah Western Railway will leave this city at 9 a. m., and returning, leave the terminal at 1 o'clock p. m.

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## City Council.—Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, April 27, 1879, Mayor Little presiding.

A petition was received from Wm. Thompson and 19 others, asking the continuance of the water mains on the corner of Temple Street to Sixth Street. Referred to the committee on water works.

A petition was received from L. Reggel and others, asking an extension of the water mains west to their residences in the Seventh Ward, and agreeing to pay water rates for one year in advance. Referred to the committee on water works.

A petition was received from W. W. Ritter, manager of the Utah Western Railway, asking the Council for the removal of the railroad engine house, and asking a still further extension of 15 days in which to make the removal. Granted.

A communication was received from J. W. Currier stating that a letter was prepared to number the streets in the city if the Council would so arrange (the matter of the numbering could be done). Referred to the committee on municipal affairs.

A petition was received from Wm. Thompson, asking the Council to open Fifth West Street, running south to his house. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

A petition was received from H. Linwood, Alfred Best and Robert Pickett, asking the privilege of using a portion of the street and sidewalk on Main street, in front of the Taylor Hotel ruins on which to place building material. Granted.

A petition from a great many merchants asking that the streets be sprinkled, was granted, during the pleasure of the council, the work to be done by the firemen under the direction of the chief engineer or at the same rates, and under similar conditions as last season.

The marshal and the police were instructed to require at once the cleaning up of all places where filth is allowed to accumulate, that the city may put in a healthy condition for the coming warm season.

A motion instructing citizens within the limits to grade their sidewalks by the 10th of May, or the commissioners would assess the work and it would be performed by the city at the expense of persons neglecting, was discussed and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

The matter of the grade of Second South Street, between East Temple and First East Streets, was referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

The Council adjourned till next Tuesday evening, at 7 o'clock.

"Pinafore" Benefit.—As was expected, a large and fashionable audience attended the Theatre last evening, the pit, parquette circle and first circle being well filled, and a fair sprinkling in the upper galleries. In the old, Mrs. Careless' "Loving Heart Trust On" was rapturously applauded, and the lady gave an encore, "She's Fooling Thee," with excellent taste and spirit. Mr. Young's "Nancy Lee," which was also encored, came quite up to the public anticipation, which, in view of the gentleman's prestige, is sufficiently eulogistic of the effort.

"Buffalo Bill"—On Friday evening, Hon. W. F. Cody, the original "Buffalo Bill," will make his first appearance in this city at the Theatre. In the sensational solo-drama, "The Knight of the Plains," written expressly for him by Col. Prentiss Ingraham. Mr. Cody's eventful life on the plains as a scout, with his natural ability and experience as an actor, enable him to present an accurate and thrilling portrait of the character he represents, which has been one of the chief stage attractions in the west for some time. He will be assisted by the Burge's Brothers, special Indian interpreters of the U. S. Government, Pa-chi-shik, the white boy chief of the Pawnees, and a full dramatic company. He will also appear on Saturday afternoon at a matinee, and on Saturday night.

Temple Rock-laying Resumed.—Rock-laying on the Salt Lake Temple was resumed this morning. The work ceased last fall and has just begun for the season. A new engine has been recently placed, the central elevated platform has been raised 12 feet, and by means of the four boom derricks, the work of placing and setting the stones will progress regularly. The walls are now 40 feet above the ground, within five courses of the steeple corner, which is the square of the first story. The structure already shows above the enclosing wall, and presents a noble and massive appearance.

Runaway.—A furious horse, with a harness on, came up the State Road this afternoon, turned west toward the Theatre corner, struck for the sidewalk at the Emporium corner and after traveling it half way west, to the terror of the populace, dashed across the street, and was caught and stopped by running into the chain near the City Market yard. No one was hurt.

## Police Court.—A pickpocket, for stealing \$2, was fined \$25, and put to work to liquidate that amount.

A disciple of Confucius, for entering the house of another Chinaman, and carrying away some property, was fined \$5 and costs.

The Miles Case.—No jury yet in the Miles case. Recomes has been had to the jury box four times for additional hearing. Eleven are secured, however. The court took recess at noon to-day, until tomorrow morning, to give the Marshal time to make the necessary service. It is supposed, the jury will wait about three days.

Narrow Escape.—The Junction relates a narrow escape which yesterday afternoon befel an infant child of Mr. Malan, of Ogden. A little girl was wheeling the carriage containing the child across the bridge of a wide deep stream on Eighth Street, when her attention being withdrawn for a moment, the carriage went over into the water, upset, and, with the child under, floated down the stream. A courageous young lady, near by, saw the accident and rescued the infant from its perilous position just in time to save it from drowning.

Funeral.—The funeral of Bishop S. A. Woolley's little daughter, who died yesterday of diphtheria, took place to-day, from the Bishop's farm residence. The ceremonies were to have been conducted at the 9th Ward School-house, but by advice of Dr. S. B. Young the above change was made.

It is advisable that in cases of death from this malignant disease, funerals should be conducted as privately as possible, and that children especially should not be brought into the vicinity of the remains. Still superior friends please remember this!

We deeply sympathize with Bishop Woolley and his family in their bereavement, and hope they will not be called to endure again a trial of this severe character.
