## ICE CONDEMNED BY STATE CHEMIST

Owners of \$50,000 Worth of Frozen Liquid Protest Against Harms' Report.

PROBATION TO BRIGHAM CITY.

Willard Power Plant Figures in the Project for Extending Hot Springs Line—Probate Business.

Ogden, March 11.—The report of State Chemist Harms to the effect that the ice from the Shupe, James, Griffith and Phoenix ponds is impure and not fit for domestic use, has caused the owners to come forward with strong protests against the report, claiming it to be partial and incorrect. The gentlemen maintain that if the ice from certain other ponds is pure, with the water coming from the same source, and the ponds being in the same condition as those condemned, then their ice is pure also. The crop of ice condemned is valued at about \$50,000, which, if it can only be used for refrigerator purposes, will reduce its value to about one quarter. The owners propose having a private analysis made of the ice to test the correctness of Mr. Harms' report. The owners of the condemned ice have no desire of selling impure product to the people of Ogden, but maintain that the ice is all right for all uses. The committee of the city council is making a thorough investigation of the complaints.

**TROLEY TO BRIGHAM CITY.**  
Power Plant at Willard Figures in Extension of Hot Springs Line.

Ogden, March 11.—The purchase by M. S. Browning and his associates of the water rights of Willard canyon is the beginning of the gentlemen's acquiring water rights that will furnish power to generate electricity for the Ogden and Northwestern railroad and the lighting of the Utah hot springs. David Eccles announces that if business conditions improve the line from the springs to Brigham city will be commenced this summer. The power plant at the mouth of the Utah hot springs, David Eccles maintains that it can be run by electricity from the company's own plant.

**RICHFIELD.**  
STAKE CONFERENCE.

Resolution Adopted Favoring Prohibition for Sevier County.

Richfield, Sevier Co., March 9.—The regular quarterly conference of the Sevier stake was held at Richfield Saturday and Sunday, March 7 and 8. Of the general authorities present were Elder M. L. Lyman and Elder George Albert Smith were present. The various wards and the auxiliary organizations of the stake were reported, showing the same to be in good condition. President Seegmiller in his report of the stake stated that there were 43 missionaries in the field with 10 more going. There had been expended during 1907 the sum of \$1,779.74 for the support of the stake. Of this amount \$706.45 has been received from fast offerings.

The principal subjects treated at the conference were the Word of Wisdom and prohibition. At a late conference of the high priests' quorum held at Monroe a resolution was adopted pledging the quorum to work for prohibition and the presidency was subsequently elected a committee to take the necessary steps to carry the resolution into effect. A resolution was passed at this conference endorsing the action of the high priests' quorum in support of the presidency of this quorum in taking such steps as it might see fit to advance this cause. The various sessions of the conference were well attended and the speakers were listened to with rapt attention.

**ALPINE.**  
CLOSES LIFE'S LABORS.

Mrs. Ruth A. Smith Succumbs to Paralysis at 79.

Alpine, Utah Co., March 8.—Thursday morning Mrs. Ruth Atherton Smith departed this life. She was born at Upholland, Lancashire, England, Oct. 1, 1829, and was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Dec. 10, 1852. The summer following she was married to Robert Banks Smith. Together they emigrated to Utah in the spring of 1853.

Her house was constantly open to the elders in England, and many times they gave the last cent they had to assist those who were laboring as missionaries there. She was a true and faithful Latter-day Saint. She labored untiringly in the Relief society.

She has been in declining health for some time, but the immediate cause of her death was paralysis. Mrs. Smith was disinherited for the gospel's sake. Rather than give up her religious faith she lost an inheritance of over \$50,000. She was the mother of 14 children, eight of whom are still living, besides her husband. She leaves her husband, two daughters and four sons, besides numerous grandchildren and some great-grandchildren to cherish her memory.

DESTRUCTIVE BLAZE.

Home of Joseph Williams Burned to the Ground.

Centerville, Davis Co., March 9.—The first fire in Centerville for many years occurred this morning at daybreak, when the home of Joseph Williams caught fire from a defective chimney flue. The house was entirely destroyed in a few minutes as the building was a frame one. With some assistance of neighbors Mr. Williams reached his family and nearly all of their household effects. It was the house formerly occupied by the Davis County Nursery on the farm belonging to Mrs. E. Denel. The loss is estimated at about \$1,000. No insurance. The good citizens of the town donated liberally and cheerfully to partially remunerate Mr. Williams for the loss of his home.

The people of Centerville are exceptionally free from sickness considering the prevalence of measles, etc., in other parts of the county.

**GRAHAM, ARIZ.**  
DEATH OF MRS. GEO. SKINNER.

Pioneer of Northern Utah, Dixie and Arizona Closes Life's Labors.

Graham, Ariz., March 4.—The death of Mrs. Skinner, wife of Bishop George Skinner of the Graham ward occurred

while her husband was at stake conference Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. May E. Skutter Skinner was one of the early settlers of northern Utah, and a pioneer of Dixie and Arizona. She came from England where her parents joined the Church. She was but 32 years of age, having been born in Gravesend, Kent, England, April 21, 1855. Her early girlhood was spent in Logan, Utah, and she was married in Salt Lake City to George Skinner, Feb. 17, 1875, making 33 years they have lived together.

They were called to the Dixie mission and were among those who established the Sunset settlement near the Rio Virgin, and the united order. Twenty-seven years ago they moved to this valley and were among its very best citizens. She is the mother of 10 children, six daughters and four sons. Nine survive her. She also has 11 grandchildren.

The funeral was conducted by Counselor Peterson in the ward house, which was crowded with relatives and friends. Five bishops, four members of the high council and two of the stake presidency with a host of friends from all parts of the valley were present.

## INTERSTATE NEWS BRIEFS

**Boy Shot at Ephraim.**—About noon on Sunday, Verland, the son of Gustava Soderberg, accidentally shot himself with a target gun while out with several other boys down below the creamery.

**Park City Pioneer Dead.**—Mr. Frank Barnhott died at his home in Park City March 8 of paralysis. Deceased was 78 years old and leaves a wife and seven children to mourn his departure. He came to Park City nearly 30 years ago.

**Dixie Notes.**—At La Grange, Washington county, it had been raining, snowing or hailing for three days up to March 6, and still stormy. The winter has been so mild, however, that strawberries have been in bloom all winter, while orange trees seem to be getting acclimated, so they will be little injured by the frost.

**Fire at Bingham.**—Early Monday morning a fire broke out in the old Winnemucca office, now owned by the Utah Copper company, and the second story was destroyed before the fire was extinguished. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a defective flue. The damage is estimated at about \$400; no insurance.

**Funeral at Farmington.**—Funeral services were held March 4 at the residence of B. Combs at Farmington, over the remains of the 8-month-old boy of James Combs, being conducted by Bishop J. H. Robinson. The speakers were Rev. J. E. Carver of the Presbyterian church and Elder G. W. Palmer of the Church of Jesus Christ.

**Wyoming Blizzard.**—A Lyman correspondent states that March came in with a blizzard, there being over a foot of snow on the 5th, and still falling. The Lyman old folks were feasted on the 6th. Elder John Walker was given a farewell party last Tuesday night. He will leave for the Southern States mission in a few days. The measles are nearly a thing of the past. There are a few cases of whooping cough.

**Public Building for Ephraim.**—Senator George Sutherland has introduced a bill in the senate appropriating \$25,000 for a public building here for the use of the postoffice and forest supervisor's office. Tors Monson, a local contractor, was awarded the contract for the construction of the new public school building. W. A. Williams of Salt Lake procured the heating and plumbing. Two more of Ephraim's people, young people have decided to sail in the same boat; they are Levi Poulson and Hazel Whitlock. The ceremony was performed in the Manti temple.

**Big Horn Colony News.**—Cowley, Big Horn Co., Wyo., March 6.—George Horne has been confined to his home for three weeks with a lame foot caused by stepping on a nail.

The ward Relief society is constructing a new rock building. Rock is being hauled for the erection of a residence by Messrs. L. J. Willis, Chas. Taggart, Claude Lewis and John Stevens.

Saturday night the citizens of Cowley voted to bond the district for the erection of a school building.

**Bible Lecture at Huntsville.**—Professor Larsen of the Utah Agricultural college of Logan gave a very interesting lecture on "The Bible as Literature" to the conjoint Mutual associations Sunday. His talk was an intellectual feast.
