FORENOON ON THE EXCHANGE.

New York Bonanza Made Some Gains While May Day Suffered a Decline.

LITTLE CHIEF AN ACTIVE STOCK

No Demand for the Dals of Park City—Butler-Liberal Transfers —Closing Quotations.

Interest was centered largely upon New York Bonanza today and, during the forenoon calls, the stock stiffened quite perceptibly. Beginning with a sale at 67½ cents, it sold up to 71 cents. The offerings, being limited, were readily taken. May Day could not usher strength and the price sank slightly. The Daly stocks failed to meet with favor and no sales were recorded. Little Chief came out in big bunches and sold at anywhere from 2½ up to 4 cents, closing slightly weaker. Butler-Liberal came out at 12 and 12½ and Uncle Sam at 35½. For Wabash \$1.75 was bid, but no offerings as low as that were made.

THE SOUTH COLUMBUS.

Installation of Columbus Con. Compressors Will Insure Plenty Power.

At a recent meeting of the directors of the South Columbus Mining company of Alta, the matter of the installation of a second compressor plant was brought up for consideration, but upon the assurance of President and Manager Jacobson of the Columbus Consolidated, that his company would have plenty of power to sell after the installation of the second compressor plant, which will be ready for operation within the next six weeks, it was decided to drop the matter of purchasing a new plant.

For some time past the South Columbus has been buying power from the Columbus Con., but the service has been such that it could not always be depended upon, owing to the fact that it needed about all the power it could make in the operation of its own mines. This has greatly retarded work at the South Columbus and as good progress as many had hoped for, has not been

OPENING OF THE KENNEBEC MINES.

Manager W. J. Craig Is Now Making His Plans for the Future.

NEW EQUIPMENT TO BE ORDERED

Which Will Include Electric Power Plant and Machine Drills—Big Ore Bodies Developed.

W. J. Craig, former superintendent of the Tampa mines in Blue Island, who left the latter for the purpose of developing his entire attention to the management of the Kennebec properties near the head of the Big Cottonwood canyon, will, in a few days, make an inspection of the latter and, before his return, will have the campaign for the future fully planned.

That the Kennebec properties contain a world of ore, there is not the slightest doubt; this has been fully demonstrated in the development of the Silver Dipper Mining property in the American Fork district. The stock was held in the name of Mrs. W. S. Pierce and creditors of the W. S. Pierce estate sought to have the stock deeded over to the estate. The decision ad-judges Mrs. Pierce to be the legal and rightful owner of the property which was held by McCormick & Co. as collateral for a long time past.

M. J. Johnson, president of the Silver Dipper company, has held an option on this stock from Mrs. Pierce and the bank and now that it has been freed from litigation, he will go ahead and close up the deal by which strong eastern talents will acquire the bulk of the ground during the past two years which has been done under Mr. Craig's supervision.

The Kennebec company owns the old Reed & Benson property out of which several hundred thousand dollars were taken during the early days of mining in the Colorado district. The company now covers the divide between Big and Little Cottonwood and adjoining it on the south is the territory embraced in what was formerly known as the famous Flagstaff mine.

It is the intention of Manager Craig to install new equipment to facilitate development and he has in contemplation the installation of an electric power plant at the mouth of the canyon out of which a larger volume of water power is available. Machine drills are to be provided, and Mr. Craig is yet undetermined whether they will be of the electric pattern or not.

By the end of the year Mr. Craig will probably make such a showing that will cause no small amount of astonishment.

MAYNE'S NEVADA MINR.

Has opened a Good Lodge on the Goldfield Jim.

A. H. Mayne is doing considerable development work on the Goldfield Jim claim on the northwest slope of Columbia mountain, says the Goldfield News. An immense ledge, fully 60 feet wide, overtops on this claim and two shafts, each about 70 feet deep, have been put down on the ledge. The ore is low grade, but there are occasionally found bunches of ore assaying as high as \$20 per ton. It is the intention of Mayne to build a cyanide plant to treat this large body of low grade ore which, it is thought, will easily average \$10 to \$12 per ton.

MORRISON SHIPMENTS.

Two Car Loads to be Sent to Smelter From Nevada Mine.

Report brought in from Humboldt county, Nevada, indicate that conditions at the Morrison property are growing better hourly. This much was confirmed by George Morgan, the manager of the company during the day, who stated that he is preparing to ship out two car loads of ore upon his next visit to camp, which will be some time during the coming week. One car load is to be consigned to a smelter in this valley and the other to the Selby plant, near San Francisco.

The ore to be shipped is high grade and carries large silver values.
