

### Pilot Needed to Avoid Mines.

New York, March 23 .- On account warlike preparations on the island of Gottland, controlled by Sweden, the local authorities have, according to a Herald dispatch from Berlin, warned ships on approaching Raresund that they must take a special pilot to cross mine field. Salling vessels are given free towage.

Lithographers' Troubles Settled. New York, March 23.—It is asserted by President Pritchard of the Lithographers' International Protective and Beneficial association, that 15 large firms throughout the country have decided to employ only members of his association and end the lockout in their plants. There are nearly 10.000 workmen locked out in various parts of the country, owing to their re-fusal to sign the employers' arbitration agreement.

### **Canal Commission Meets.**

Washington, March 22.—Preliminary work was begun today by the isthmian canal commission. The first full meet-ing of the commission was held in the offices of Admiral Walker, the chair-man Little of consequence was accom-plished, the session resolving itself into an informal discussion of the various features of the preliminary work and of the preparations of the first visit of the commission to Panama. #### To Check Pneumonia.

New York, March 23 .- In an attempt to check the dessemination of pneumo-nia and germs of other diseases of the respiratory organs, President Darling-ton of the board of health has enlisted ton of the board of health has enlisted the aid of half a million school chil-dren. His idea is that they will help greatly in the enforcement of laws pro-hibiting expectoration on sidewalks and in public conveyances but that, in educating the child he will be educating the man. He has brought the matter to the attention of Henry A. Rogers, president of the board of education, who heartily approves the suggestion. Great quantities of slips are being printed by the department of health for distribution among the children, and at the same time the teachers will be expected to explain the seriousness of the dangers involved in the practise

of spitting in public places. It is designed that both boys and girls carry a little pad of the warning slips and that when they see a man violating the ordinance they will hand him a card warning him of the heavy fine to which he is liable. Public school teachers also will be directed to take particular pains in pointing out to their charges the dangers of violations of the sanitary code.

There will be no public hearings and publicity will be woided so far as possible.

The pending investigation is being conducted by Commissioner Garfield, under the direction of Secy, Cortelyou. Beyond that fact, practically nothing is obtainable. Whether the results of the investigation are to be made public at its conclusion will depend entirely on President Roosevelt.


