SIDNEY DEATH.—Joseph R. McGarry, Esq., from Fish Haven, Rich Co., of the sudden death of Henry McGarry, of Round Valley, about fifteen miles from Fish Haven, on the 1st ult. He had been cutting hay, and was mowed down by a team of horses, and died almost instantly. His remains were found almost floating in a pool of blood. The investigation, a coroner's inquest, around two logs that had fallen in the shape of a triangle against a tree—was discovered, thirty-eight yards from the dead body. From this scene the unerring hand of the assassin found the fatal shot. The sudden death of Captain Thomas J. Shaw led to suspicion, but reluctantly. He had always occupied an enviable position among his fellow men. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, and belonged to the Masonic fraternity, both church and lodge being proud of their member. What could be the motive? This has been made known by his mother, who relates that on Thursday afternoon Miss Shaw and a female relative visited Dr. Sanders at his residence for medical aid. The doctor was all agreeable. His wife was present and he had some berries served up for the ladies. While eating them, he remarked to Miss S. who, by the way, was in perfect health, that she was sickly and needed immediate medical skill. The lady laughed at the idea; the doctor insisted that he was right, and left her temples and face in a professional manner, shaking his head ominously. He finally asked the company to leave the room, which was soon vacated. He was no sooner alone with Miss Shaw than he placed her under the influence of chloroform and attempted a nefarious crime. The lady was in vigorous health and by main force prevented him from accomplishing his base design. While yet under the influence of the chloroform, he took her to the public room and told her relative that he was now ready to give her his medical attention. With the innocence and confidence of pure maidenhood, this lady, beautiful and feeble, went into his room. He gave her smelling salts, bathed her temples and administered chloroform while playing the part of the attentive and solicitous physician. He threw her on a sofa; her head sank; she fainted; and when she returned to consciousness he had accomplished his hellish purpose. The young lady was frantic with grief and shame, while Sanders tried to quiet her by saying that he had treated many cases in the same way; that he would leave her in the hands of his wife, and she would be his for life and marry her. The young ladies went to their home in the country that evening (Thursday), accompanied by Captain Tom Shaw, and the next morning Dr. Sanders was killed as mentioned above.
