ANOTHER RAILROAD TO DENVER.—The Denver Tribune, of the 20th inst., says an enthusiastic meeting of the prominent citizens of Abilene, Kansas, has been held to consider the project of building a railroad from that place to Denver. Considerable capital has been enlisted in the enterprise, and its accomplishment seems likely. Along the route proposed are some of the best farming lands in Kansas with excellent ranges for grazing. The distance from Denver to Abilene will be about 600 miles. Twenty-six miles shorter than via the Kansas Pacific. The new line would bridge the South Fork of the Republican and the Kiowa, Bijou and Platte rivers.

The prizes are varied, being a small penknife, pipe, pair of gloves, or something else, worth nearly half the price of the box.

IMPORTATIONS.—Rev. Wm. D. Roberts, who left this city on the 13th of last December to go East, under the auspices of the Deseret Parent Society for the Improvement and Cultivation of Stock, &c., has brought back with him two hundred and forty stands of Italian bees, which he purchased of Adam Grimes, of Johnson, Wisconsin, forty stands of which being in G. D. Wood & Co., of Springfield, Utah county; also a bear and sow of the Ohio Improved Chester White and sow of the thoroughbred Berkshire, and two sows and a pair of the Maine breed, a pair of the star Game Pheasants and three ducks and a pair of Golden Quails. The latter birds he intends to turn loose on the range, with the hope that all persons will refrain from capturing or killing them. If suffered to run undisturbed for a few years, our country will soon be stocked with this choice fowl. In St. Louis, a country where quails have always been abundant, they are considered such fine eating that they sell for about two dollars a dozen in the market.

Bro. Roberts does not wish to deliver the bees that he has just imported, but has an opportunity to examine them and satisfy himself that they are in good condition. He desires to deliver them in good order, so that there will not be the least cause for complaint on the part of those for whom he has made the purchases. The present cloudy weather is unfavorable to giving them the desired scrutiny, as soon as the weather is sufficiently warm and pleasant, he will have them delivered, and when ready for delivery, he will give public notice so that all who are interested in them can go at one time and have their bees delivered to them.

TO KEEP HORSES' HOOFBES CLEAR OF SNOW.—The following simple method, recommended to keep the hoofs of horses free from balls of snow, may be useful just now:

To prevent balls of snow on horse's feet, let the hoof and fetlock be well cleaned, and then rub with wet soap previous to their going out in the snow. This will effectively prevent balls of snow from coming on the foot, which will sometimes cause the animal to fall, and if not, make his progress doubly tedious.
