

HEARST DECLARES HE IS A DEMOCRAT

Of the Jeffersonian Variety, Though, and Not of the Corporation Kind.

HAS NO USE FOR M'CARREN.

Latter Says Will be Plurality of 75,000 in Brooklyn Against Him if He Runs Up Independent Ticket.

Chatham, N. Y., Oct. 5.—William Randolph Hearst, the Democratic and Independence league candidate for governor, had his attention directed today to a published statement by P. H. McCarrren, Democratic organization leader of Brooklyn, that if Mr. Hearst persists in having Independence league candidates nominated in Kings county there will be a plurality of 75,000 against him in Brooklyn.

"The question of whether Brooklyn goes 75,000 one way or the other is for the citizens of Brooklyn to decide, and not for Mr. McCarrren to decide," said Mr. Hearst. "I have the utmost consideration for the wishes of the citizens of Brooklyn, and none whatever for the wishes of Mr. McCarrren. In pinning an Independent ticket in the field in Brooklyn we are doing what we believe to be for the best interests of the citizens of Brooklyn. Mr. McCarrren, by calling himself a Democrat, does not make himself an honest man. If he should call his ticket a good ticket it would not make it a good ticket. As a matter of fact, the McCarrren ticket is notoriously untruthful and should not command the support of honest Democrats or honest Independents.

"I am a Democrat, but a Jefferson Democrat, not a corporation Democrat, and I cannot allow a hired agent of the corporation like McCarrren to define my Democracy or dictate unworthy candidates for me to support."

WHAT M'CARREN SAID.

New York, Oct. 5.—Mr. McCarrren said he had no reply to make to Mr. Hearst's statement. Asked regarding his communication of yesterday with Mr. Hearst, he said:

"I have sent no letter to Mr. Hearst, but I did send a messenger to him yesterday with instructions to inform him of the probable result in Kings county if he should oppose the Democratic judicial ticket in the Second judicial district. I believe I did suggest that the county would give Hughes about 75,000 majority in the event of his bolting the Democratic ticket. I do not tell him to use the words, 'You do this at your peril.' I made no threats, but merely stated a few facts which I thought might interest Mr. Hearst. There is nothing I can say to the

DISARMAMENT OF THE INSURGENTS

Gen. Funston Says That it Will be Completed in Two or Three Days.

WARSHIPS WILL BE RECALLED

Largest Ones Soon as Enough Troops Landed in Cuba to Protect Provisional Government.

Havana, Oct. 5.—Brig-Gen. Funston said this morning that the process of disarming the insurgents throughout the island will be completed in two or three days. The disarmament is finished in Puerto Principe, and is almost completed in Santiago. There is some delay in Havana province because Gen. Asbert's followers are largely scattered. It is expected that they will be concentrated today near Guinez. A detachment of 25 marines has been sent to Guinez to keep order pending the disarming of Asbert's men.

TO RECALL WARSHIPS.

Washington, Oct. 5.—It is expected that the largest ships of the American fleet if not all of them, will be withdrawn from Cuban waters as soon as there is sufficient army force landed to afford security to the provisional government and the protection of property interests. The ships themselves, it is stated, at the department, do not afford any protection to Cuban interests save as being quick transports and barracks for the bluejackets and marines which have been landed on the island. There is no suggestion that the big guns of the ships or even the smaller batteries would be used against the towns and cities whose harbors are large enough to accommodate naval vessels. There is stated at the department that the ships will be ordered to resume cruises which were interrupted when the rush orders to proceed to Cuba were issued.

Gov. Taft has the direction of the vessels in Cuban waters. The sailings and arrivals are reported to the navy department here as the regulations require, but the orders to the naval officers are given by the war secretary. The withdrawal of the ships will no doubt depend upon the wishes of Secy. Taft after the army has landed.

FOOTBRIDGE COLLAPSES.

Party of Students Precipitated Forty Feet Into Stream, One Killed.

Menominee, Mich., Oct. 5.—While a party of 25 students of the Oconto (Wis.) high school were standing on a footbridge at Oconto Falls, Wis., today, watching the falls, the structure collapsed, hurling the whole party 40 feet into the stream. William Eilou, aged 14 years, was killed, and Viga Sentil, Hazel Dentson and Frank Donley seriously injured. Prof. Newcomb, the instructor, was badly hurt and several others were slightly injured. The bridge was 200 feet long, but the water in the stream is only three feet deep. Twenty-five other students had left the bridge just before it fell.

KING OF ANNAM'S DEEDS.

Are so Atrocious France May Adopt Disciplinary Measures.

Paris, Oct. 5.—Thanh Thai, king of Annam, according to stories reaching Paris from Indo-China, has again been guilty of such atrocities that the French government may be compelled to adopt rigorous disciplinary measures, as it did several years ago when, on account of the scandal caused by the barbarous torture of the king's personal attendants, the French resident at the head of the gendarmerie entered the palace to save the lives of the attendants and restore order. The mails now report that in August the king was seized with a homicidal mania, and ordered seven of his wives to be executed and looked on with delight as they were slowly tortured to death. A few days later the king shot down a prince, who was 70 years old, a member of the council of the royal family, highly esteemed, and the last surviving son of King Minh Mang. When the French resident called latterly to permit him to enter the palace, the king wanted to come to Paris, as the king of Cambodia did, but the French press de-

SOLDIER COMMITS SUICIDE.

Leavenworth, Kan., Oct. 6.—Private John West, for 25 years a member of company D, Eighteenth infantry, went into the basement of the company barracks this afternoon shortly after 1 o'clock and killed himself with a potato knife. He severed the jugular vein, and was dead ten minutes later. West's brother C. R. West, is said to be one of the prominent merchants of Seymour, Ia. The deceased left no note or word regarding the cause for the deed.

A FATAL FIGHT.

Two Clerks Engage in One, Fall From Fourth Story and Are Killed.

Cleveland, Oct. 5.—Clutched in each other's arms, two young men fell from the fourth story of the Lake Shore railroad office building and were hurled to their death on the pavement below, at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The dead men are J. V. Bunts, aged 30, and Harry Wilfred, aged 17 years, both of whom were clerks in the office

of the superintendent of motive power of the Lake Shore railroad. Bunts was killed instantly, and Wilfred died in an ambulance while being conveyed to a hospital.

The young men had some trouble previously, and a renewal of this led to an altercation between them. It was as a result of this that they fell from the window, which was open directly in front of them.

During their flight through the air neither relaxed his death-like grasp, and each held to the other till their bodies struck the pavement.

UNION RULES CHANGED.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 5.—The wood, wire and metal workers' international union changed its rules to enable wood-

lathers to accept a lower wage in learning metal lathing. The union will require all members of New York union not affiliated with the international to pay full initiation fees when they join local unions outside of that city. This is expected to force the independent bodies of New York to affiliate with the organization.

SEVENTH LEAVES FT. HARRISON.

Helena, Mont., Oct. 5.—The battalion of the Seventh regiment U. S. A., stationed at Fort Harrison, left today for Fort Wayne, Mich., by special train over the Northern Pacific. The Sixth infantry returning from the Philippines will be here Dec. 1. The Seventh troops stationed at Fort Missoula and Assiniboine also left today.
