

HOME CONSUMPTION CLUB.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce had an interesting meeting beginning shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, those present being President Hubbard and Directors W. H. Bowe, J. S. Cameron, A. H. Cannon, L. P. Kidney, H. P. G. Coate and M. J. Gray.

It was unanimously decided to endeavor to raise a fund of \$100 to be offered as a prize for an essay on "Salt Lake City as a Metropolis."

Frank W. Jennings, chief of the engineering department for the West's Fair, asked the chamber to take steps to interest the manufacturers of the Territory in preparing a fine exhibit. Referred to the committee on insurance.

A committee was instructed to call a meeting in the near future, to be composed of representative business men whose duty it shall be to organize a home consumption club.

On motion of Director Cannon, the president appointed a committee to visit with the founders and managers of the local factories and mercantile establishments in the manufacture of iron fencing for use in the city.

THE MINING CONGRESS.

It will be held in Salt Lake on June 5th if \$40,000 can be raised for the purpose.

It is now believed that the national mining congress will undoubtedly be held here. The date fixed is June 5th, and the amount of money to be raised \$50,000.

At the meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce yesterday evening W. H. McCormick presided and Charles R. St. Louis as secretary. The speakers in favor of the congress being held here were W. F. James, vice-president of the National Mining Association; Judge Goodwin, R. C. Ewing, Frank Gillospie and Mr. Mayer Scott.

A committee on arrangements was appointed and authorized to name a finance committee out of the members to take the necessary money to defray the expense of the conference.

The general views of those present was that unless \$5,000 could be raised it would be difficult to attempt to hold the meeting here.

AVOID A QUARANTINE.

Two citizens of Granger prefect reported that smallpox and influenza were raging in their locality so much as to call for the advice of the physician. It was advised that the disease had been introduced into the community by the miners who had come to the country to work in the coal mines. The county physician was instructed to investigate the matter and render aid and protection as needed. Advice was given that a quarantine "prevailing" in the same locality.

OSCAR AND DANIELSON.

Delegations Morris, requesting for the removal of the bridge crossing the river at the mouth of the Ogallala River, the bridge having been built by the said railroad company, and afterwards, upon the request of their agents, an order was issued suspending the bridge, since it was a hindrance to the general use, and at the time of the laying of the track acrossed the said railroad company made such representations as to make travel on the wagon road impossible that the destruction of the bridge was ordered by the said railroad company. And further, that the bridge in question was originally built by the said railroad company, and afterwards, upon the request of their agents, an order was issued suspending the bridge, since it was a hindrance to the general use, and at the time of the laying of the track acrossed the said railroad company and kept it closed by the said company. In conclusion, he reported to the bridge is at this time in good repair, and is a hindrance to the use of the wagon road, and the Mr. A. W. Water, general superintendent of the Ogallala Western railroad company, should be at once notified to cause the bridge to be repaired or rebuilt, place proper guards around it, and to have it open for general travel. The report was adopted.

The board adjourned until Wednesday night.
