## MONEY FOR STATE.

#### Utah Will Receive Amount of \$4,425.47 On Lands Sale.

Gov. Cutler today received notice from the treasury department at Washington, D. C., that an account had been rendered between the govern-ment and the State of Utah in regard to the sale of public lands in this state during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, and that the 5 per cent of the total proceeds of the sale, which will be paid to the state, amounts to \$4,425.47. A warrant for this amount will be issued by the treasury department and forwarded to the governor at once.
