EASTERN.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., 24.—Preston Gant and family leave this city at 8-15 to-morrow, on a special train over the Kansas Pacific R.R., for Denver and the famous summer resorts of the Rocky Mountains.

NEW YORK, 24.—A Boston letter says that the completion of the Hoosac tunnel and the consolidation of the railroad interests of Boston, the latter hopes to share in the western trade, which is to undergo a great and rapid development. Boston expects to become a grand grain depot through her new railroads and harbor and dock improvements.

NEW YORK, 24.—James Brooks is reported to be somewhat better.

EVANSVILLE, Ind.—Ex-Governor William Pickering, of this State, died at the residence of his son, Richard Pickering, in Edwards Co., Ind., on Tuesday last, of apoplexy. He was one of the oldest residents and most influential citizens of Indiana.

WASHINGTON, 24.—The following is a summary of the condition of the agricultural test, issued from the agricultural department:

In the first week of April a considerable portion of the northern belt of the winter wheat area was covered with snow. The condition of that soil gave promise of a general exemption from winter frost, leaving the crop subject to the meteorological vicissitudes of April. In the middle States great improvement upon the showing of last year, especially in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. The prospect in the States south of Maryland is less favorable than last year, and there are indications of diminishing area in the eastern States, although the acreage is not intended to be given in this report. Michigan, the only state of the northern border in which winter wheat is mainly grown, has a green and vigorous growth, though the snow has disappeared, and Ohio makes far more favorable returns than last year. In Kentucky a more checkered showing is made, giving promise of a good crop, but the weather is unfavorable east, with indications of future improvement as the weather becomes settled. In Indiana and Illinois the unfavorable returns outnumbered the favorable. The dry soil retarded early germination, and left the plants too weak and shallow rooted to endure the effects of winter's changes of temperature. Similar causes effect the condition of the wheat in Missouri, which is reported to be over last year, and a still more favorable condition exists in Kansas. In Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska, as is known, very little winter wheat is sown, but most of it is good, and the yield is increased. The indications from California all point to another year of great abundance, scarcely a county reporting any unfavorable conditions, and as a whole the wheat at the close of the season is more favorable than at the same date in 1872.

CHICAGO, 24.—A. D. Bell, a member of the body of men who shot him in the head, to-night, will die. He was a French Count in 1848, and received 300,000 in gold, and squandered it in Europe in two years. He then came to Chicago and went into the commission business. On "Change" he lost 30,000 in cornets, became dependent and attempted to take his life last Monday, but the revolver was discharged by one of his hands.

Honor Metzler, aged 28, committed suicide here this morning. She was dissipated and her husband broke up housekeeping and took their children away from her.

CHICAGO, 24.—A freight train on the Central Pacific, this p.m., ran over the body of a man, who had been ditched. Geo. Ross, the man, was fatally injured. His body was partially recovered.

CHICAGO, 24.—A shooting duel was fought at the residence of the late Lewis Price, a woman in the mill, J. A. Gandy, the gunsmith, under circumstances which will be fully detailed in the paper.

CHICAGO, 24.—A. H. Bailey has seized twenty-three locomotives, thirty-eight passenger and three baggage cars of the N. Y. Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for non-payment of taxes.

WESTERN.

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LEAVENWORTH, Ks.—Senatorial election was held to-morrow night. Senator Grant, a Radical, received 24,000 votes.

MARSHAL, 24.—A party of soldiers, each taking sides for and against the permanent commission by which the body of the Assembly hoped to control the ministry. Sermo, apparently, hoped to determine the balance against the

ministry by a coup d'état, through a military demonstration and pronouncement of law, favoring the party of orders, and against the dismission of the permanent commission. His plan failed because, at the critical moment, the soldiers, fatigued with the people, and the volunteers proved fainthearted and indolent.

On Wednesday night Contreras, Captain-General of Catalonia, was fired at near Plasencia by volunteers, who had taken arms in defense of the permanent commission.

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
