The hearing in the *habeas corpus* case of Mr. George A. Meyer, a whiskey test case, will take place to-morrow, before the Supreme Court.

Anton Karwinski, a native of Germany, and Wm. N. Cook, a native of England, were admitted as citizens to-day. This was all the business transacted in the District Court.

Sisters E. R. Snow Smith, E. R. Wells and E. B. Ferguson will attend the meetings of the ladies of Weber Stake, first two leave by the morning train, the latter the following morning.

The hearing on the motion to dissolve attachment in the case of the Utah and Pleasant Valley Coal Company vs. the Utah and Pleasant Valley Railroad Company, has been continued until Saturday.

"The League of American Wheelmen" (Bicyclists) met at Boston, about 800 strong, on the 30th of May, and held a grand parade. It was witnessed by thousands of people. There are about 8,000 riders now in America.

The grand entertainment at the Tenth Ward Assembly Hall to-morrow (Thursday) evening at 8 o'clock, for the benefit of C. J. Swann, should not be forgotten. "Sambo's Ghost," an olio, and "My Turn Next," are the attractive programme.

Mrs. David Hilton, of the 20th Ward, has raised some of the largest and most successful business in the city. They are of the Sharpless seedling variety, and are even finer than those exhibited in this office by Mr. Robert Dye, of the same Ward, a few days ago.

In the liquor case to be argued before the Supreme Court to-morrow, it is desired to have the validity of the liquor ordinance sufficiently tested. Messrs. A. Miner and J. L. Rawlins will represent the city, and Messrs. Arthur Brown and C. P. Hines the liquor men. The fight will doubtless be a strong one.

At the school election held in the Third District, Monday evening, T. O. Angell was the trustee elected for one year, in place of Jas. W. Eard. Absent: John Y. Smith for two years in place of George Stringfellow, absent; for three years, to fill the regular vacancy. Jacob Weller was chairman of the meeting; E. M. Weller, secretary.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

A brilliant maneuver—An amateur bicyclist performed a very brilliant feat on the City Hall corner, last evening. His wheel, which had been broken, was running at full tilt along the sidewalk, when the rider, who had apparently lost all control of himself and horse, leaped suddenly forward, and putting his hands firmly upon the ground in front of the flying machine, rolled completely over. The effect was instantaneous. The fiery untamed was checked in mid career, and immediately assumed a position of docile recumbency upon the pavement at the side of the prostrate owner. It was a master stroke of grace and skill. The horse in now broken thoroughly.

CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, June 5th, 1881, Mayor Little presiding:

Applications for license to transact business as liquor dealers were made from Newman & Reed, Z. C. M. I. Drug department, and Godde, Pitts & Co. The latter firm inserting the following proviso in their application: "With the understanding that any reduction or benefit enjoyed by other liquor dealers since the late decision of the District Court shall be granted to us, taking effect from the date of our last quarterly license and to be so stated in the license for which we now apply." Applications received and licenses granted.

A communication on the subject of license from Godde, Pitts & Co., was read, and it was decided by the sense of the Council that their request was just and equitable and would be granted by the Council at the termination of the proceedings now pending.

The following bills for the month of May were allowed: The expense bill of the City Marshal's department, \$137.50; bill of the Salt Lake City Gas Company for street lamps, \$920.83; for gas to city buildings, \$41.30; total, \$952.13; bill of assistant watermasters, \$385; night watchman Burgess for services in guarding Market lot, \$8; James Sheldermire, city weighmaster, salary, \$40; less amount realized from weigh charges and pasture, \$5.70. Adjusted for one week.

Sentenced for Life.—The Ogden Herald states that yesterday morning Wm. Mays, aged 30, and Henry Overholt, aged 21, both stage robbers, sentenced for life to the prison at Auburn, N.Y., arrived in Ogden under the charge of George Froman, guard of the Penitentiary in Boise, Idaho. They were placed in the Weber County Jail over night and this morning were to proceed eastward in care of U. S. Marshal Chase. On the 18th of November, 1879, they attacked and robbed a U. S. mail stage coach at Pilgrims Springs, Idaho. Pursuit was made on them and they were finally overtaken in Oregon and brought back to Idaho. On January 23d, 1880, they received their sentence for several years' imprisonment at hard labor in the Boise Penitentiary, from which they escaped in the following September, in company with two other convicts. They roamed about for months, often going hungry for days, hunting for game, themselves the eagerly hunted game of the officers of the law, who at last surrounded them on Boise River, where, after hard fighting on both sides, in which two or three officers and one of the convicts fell victims, they were forced to surrender. They were taken to Boise City and placed under close surveillance, while their former sentence was changed into the one indicated above.

The Minstrels.—Haverly's Mastodons, the most powerful combination of minstrels in the world, are billed for three nights at the Salt Lake Theatre, commencing to-morrow evening.

Snow Smith, E. B. Wells, E. C. S. Clawson, Camilla Cobb, Louise Felt, and Jane Preese. In the afternoon, after the intellectual exercises were over, a dancing party was held, excellently managed by Brother Samuel Bateman, during which refreshments were distributed to the company. The entire affair was very successful. It is planned to note the rapid progress of these associations in our midst, and that they may grow and increase in the future proportionately as they have in the past, is our earnest wish and desire.
