DIVERT ORES FROM SALT LAKE.

W. R. Alberger Says Ely-Goldfield Railroad Will Have That Effect.

Regarding the results of the construction of the Eky-Goldfield railroad, the construction of which is to begin next month. W. R. Alberger is quoted by the Goldfield Tribume as saying that at the present time no ores running less than 540 a ton in gold values are being milled in south western Nevada. Ores running 540 or more to the ton in gold are successfully and economically handfied in the mills of that section. Ores of less than 540 a ton in gold values are either shipped to the smelt-ers at Salt Lake or are put on the dumps to await an outlet. If is not profitable to ship to the Salt Lake val-ley sinciters ores that carry much less than 520 a ton. All lesser values are left on the dumps.

the dumps. With the construction of this road

With the construction of this road completed, these ores down to a valu-ation as low as 38 a ton will be avail-able for smelting in this district. "With the possibility of securing the handling and smelting of this enormous tonnage of ore here, and with the opening of the way for the Goldfield and southwestern Nevada ores to this district, there is no reason why this should not become the center for an enormous smelter industry. I feel safe in making the prediction that many hundreds of thousands of tons of low grade ores, ores that cannot be milled profitably, will be carried into this val-by to be treated. Sales of lake have been made recently at 14 cents, but the owners state that they would not sell for that figure today. Sellers of the metal are waiting to see what turn the altustion will take and refuse to quote a price for the metal until conditions become more settled. Estimates of the sale of copper dur-ing the current month are that be-tween 125,000,000 and 150,000,000 pounds have been disposed of. It is doubtful if the producers' December statement in-uides in the surplus a large contage which has already been sold but not delivered. The total exports to data are close to 40,000,000 pounds, so that the home sales have been the import-ant factor.
