GOV. CHAMBERLAIN **ON JAPANESE AGITATION** 

Salam, Or., Feb. 9.—George E. Cham-beriain, governor of Oregon and United States senator-elect, while opposed to Ariatic immigration considers anti-Japanese agitation as til-advised. After the Oregon state senate refused to the Oregoni state ments in desite to consider favorably the Balley anti-Asi-atic resolution, Gov. Chamberlain is-sued the following statement regarding the subject, making especial reference to the anti-Japanese legislation in Cali-

fornia: "I am not entirely familiar with the character of the anti-Japanese legisla-tion pending before the California leg-islature. Personally I am opposed on principle to Chinese, Japanese and all

principle to Chinese, Japanese and all other Asiatic immigration, but I am inclined to believe that in the present emergency, and in view of the efforts of the president to secure an amicable adjustment of the cupices between this country and the empire of Japan, state legislatures ought to be conserva-tive in all legislation on the subject, trusting to a satisfactory outcome of negotiations now pending between the two governments. Hasty, ill-advised or retailatory measures at this time might scriously interfere with these ne-sotiations and precipitate a conflict be-tween two countries which might, by a nonservative course, be entirely avoid-

Washington, Feb. 8.—The United States government disaydws all respon-sibility for recent remarks made by Ropresentative Rainey of Illinois criti-cising President Obaidia of Panama. This is indicated in a leiter sent today by Secy. Bacon to C. G. Arosmena, min-later from Panama, in reply to a pro-test by the latter in behalf of his gov-ernment Mr. Bacon's letter says: "The utienances of individual mem-bers are not to be taken as expressing like views either of the goverament of the Cuited States or of the house in which such remarks are made. As re-gards the statements in question made

As re-gards the statements in question made by Representative Rainey, the presi-dent attaches so little importance to them that he had not even read them until your protest came. He has now read them, and none of them concerni-ing which he had knowledge has any foundation in fact. The president need hardly say that this government dis-avows all responsibility for the remarks of Representative Rainey to which you refer."
