

CONFIRMATION OF MARSHAL SPRY

Committee Action Preliminary
There to Will be Taken on
Monday Next.

NO OPPOSITION EXPECTED.

His Appointment Will be Considered
on the Anniversary of the Nam-
ing of Mr. Heywood.

By a singular coincidence it is just
four years ago—that is, it will be on
Monday, since President Roosevelt
nominated Ben. R. Heywood as United
States marshal of Utah. The singu-
larity occurs in the fact that on Mon-
day the judiciary committee of the sen-

within the next few weeks, just as
soon as his commission arrives, which
will doubtless be as soon as the usual
red tape in this class of cases can be
unwound.

(Special to the "News.")
Washington, D. C., Jan. 27.—The
nomination of Wm. Spry to be U. S.
marshal for Utah, will come up for
action in the senate committee on ju-
diciary on Monday and there is every
reason to believe that it will be report-
ed favorably to the next succeeding
executive sessions of the senate.

The report is denied that any charges
have been filed against confirmation
of Spry. There are no papers whatever
affecting his nomination before the
committee and so far as the chairman
is advised action on Monday will meet
formal endorsement with recommenda-
tion that the nomination be confirmed.

The appointment was made on the
joint recommendation of Senators Suth-
erland and Smoot and Representative
Howell, and all three gentlemen having
joined in endorsement of Mr. Spry, in
fact there was no other candidate hav-
ing endorsement of either of the Utah
senators or the representative.

No action on the nomination has been
taken to the present time for the sim-
ple reason that the judiciary commit-
tee has had no meeting since the name of
Mr. Spry was sent to the senate. In
this connection, it may be said that
there is entire harmony between the
three members of the Utah delegation

which has two factories in that state.

I represent in the senate," said he,
"and the Mormon people, not any in-
dividual group of Mormon officials, but
the state of Utah and the Republican
party. Joseph F. Smith, president of
the quorum of board of apostles, of
which I am a member, has no more in-
fluence with me than has any other
honest citizen of Utah.

"Why, in all my services as senator
I have received only one letter from
under the name of Joseph F. Smith,
President Smith. That was a request
from him that I secure the reappoint-
ment of Edward Anderson as surveyor.
Instead, I supported the candidacy of
Thomas Hull, who was appointed by
President Roosevelt. This of itself
ought to show how ridiculous is the
statement of my opponents that I am
under the influence of the church or
of President Joseph F. Smith."

When asked if he were still a mem-
ber of the quorum, Senator Smoot
said: "Yes, I am still a member of the
quorum but I have leave of absence.
I secured this leave of absence as soon
as I became a candidate for the senate.
Had Moses Thatcher, about whose case
so much has been said, asked for and
received leave of absence when he en-
tered the race for the senate in Utah,
there would have been no opposition
to him by the church officials as such."

THE JEWS AND MESSIAH.

Subject of an Interesting Lecture by
Rabbi Freund.

Rabbi Freund lectured last night, in
the Jewish temple before a large audi-
ence on "The Jewish Idea of the Mes-
siah." The speaker said in part: "When
we come to examine Judaism and its
viewpoint of man's life, we see the ob-
verse of its teaching. It constantly
placed a hopeful view of life, trusting
to a gradual ascent toward moral bet-
terment and perfection. The Golden
Age, according to Jewish teaching, was
not in the past; it is destined to be in
the future. Its name—prophets and
great thinkers have designated it as
Messiah. Confidence in man and his
capacities has given voice to the belief
that a time will come in the near or
more distant future when progress to-
ward moral perfection will hasten the
realization of the ideal. For the Jew
the Golden Age has not been as yet.
It will come with the advent of Mes-
siah. The Jewish life is dominated by
the thought that dark though the pres-
ent might be, brighter times are yet in
store for the Jew and mankind. The
Jew has much occasion for pessimism,
but he places implicit confidence in the
future. He believes in a better time
for those who would keep God's command-
ments and live in accordance with His

will. Fictional presentations of the Jew
have tended to misrepresent him. Pre-
judice and ignorance have caused him
to be misunderstood. Enlightening edu-
cation shows him as possessing sur-
passing qualities of virtue that offset
his permanence. And so when ideals of
Jew and Judaism are acknowledged
and understood there will flower in
realization these words of a noted
French publicist, a fair critic of the
Jew and his shortcomings, a friend in
his fair-minded admiration: "The Jews
virtues are their own, their vices are
not theirs. Their virtues are the re-
sult of Judaism's teaching and the el-
ements essential to Judaism; their vices
are the result of circumstances which
the malignant world tossed about their
life. It is our duty to clear away this
mass of vicious circumstances, and to
give free play to the inherent, right-
eousness of the most ancient of
cultured peoples."

SENDS OUT WARNING.

State Health Board Urges Precaution
Against Contagious Diseases.

The state board of health issued last
evening, the following bulletin relative
to contagious and infectious diseases:
"The reports of deaths from scarlet
fever and measles indicate the extensive
prevalence of those diseases in a se-
vere form, and the necessity for the
most rigid enforcement of preventive
measures. It is discretionary with the
health officer or board of health to
quarantine persons affected with mea-
sles, and it is recommended that a report
of all cases shall be required and quar-
antine enforced for a period of not less
than two weeks. Every effort should
be made to educate the public to recog-
nize that measles and whooping cough
are not trivial complaints, as ordinarily
regarded. Whooping cough especially,
in which there are many cases existing
in the state, is a very serious disease,
both as to mortality and injurious af-
ter-effects, and the law requires that
all cases shall be promptly reported
and quarantined. It is the duty of
health officers to strictly enforce this
law."

"An unusually large number of
deaths from pneumonia occurred dur-
ing the month. This disease is steady-
ly increasing throughout the state and
demands the most earnest attention
of a health officer. It should be re-
membered that the law requires the
report of pneumonia. The disease
is infectious, and the room occupied by
the patient should be disinfected in the
same manner as in other infectious dis-
eases. Special care should be taken
to disinfect or destroy all expectoration
from pneumonia, for the reason that it
contains the infective organisms."
Section 20 of the law relating to the
registration of births and deaths pro-
vides that all certificates either of
birth or death, shall be written legibly
in undelivered ink, and no certificate shall
be held to be complete and correct that
does not supply all the items of infor-
mation called for, or satisfactorily ac-
count for their omission. Registrars
and registrars are directed to examine
all reports in order to avoid the filing
of one certificate for twins. The name
of the registrar and the date the certi-
ficate was filed with the registrar
should be entered on all certificates im-
mediately and not postponed until the
day of forwarding to the state registrar.
The exact date of filing is important
and should not be overlooked."
