ACT CONCERNING A FERRY FERRIES ACROSS BEAR RIVER, AND A BRIDGE ACROSS THE MALAD.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah. That Joseph Young, David Fullmer, John Young, and William Y. Empy have the right to establish a ferry or ferries across Bear River for three years, during the ferrying seasons of each year from the passage of this act, at a place which will best subserve the public interest, between the mouth of said river, and a point five miles cast of the mouth of the kanyon.

Sec. 2. Said Young and others shall file their bond with the Secretary of the Territory in the penal sum of one thousand dollars payable to the people of the Territory of Utah, conditioned for the faithful paying over the per centage hereinafter prescribed. Scc. 3. The said Young and others shall pay

ten per cent of all they receive as toll on said ferries and bridge to the treasurer of the Perpetual Emigrating Fund Company, on oath or affirmation on or before the first day of September annually.

Sco. 5. If any person or persons shall establish a ferry within the before described limits without a grant from the Governor and Legislative Assembly, he or they shall forfeit and pay to the people of the Territory of Utah, the sum of one thousand dollars, to be collected as an action of debt.

Sec. 6. Nothing in this act shall be so construed as to prevent any person ferrying themselves with their effects, but they shall not be allowed to soll or give their boats or crafts to any man or men except to the forry company.

Sec. 7. The said Young and others are hereby required to creet a good and substantial bridge across the Malad, about three miles west of the ferry on Bear River for three years during the ferrying seasons thereof, and are allowed the privilege of collecting toll on the same at the following rates viz :--
