

Garibaldi to the Italian Priesthood.

Late European journals contain an address from Garibaldi to the Italian priesthood:

I shall not speak of faults. When I speak to crows I quote for them these words of the Gospel: "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone." Harmony, therefore, between us, if you wish it, but act well; hitherto you have acted ill. You have made Rome a den of wild beasts, thirsting for the destruction of Italy. I am unhappily convinced that you cannot save the cardinals from perdition, but do it if you can. Moreover, cry to the four winds of heaven that you will have no companionship with the wicked; that you are Italians; that you will at least imitate the priesthood of Hungary, of Poland, of Greece, of China, of the savages of America, where the priest does not deny his cradle, his relations, his fellow citizens, but combat together with them for the independence of their country. Let the Italian priest launch forth from the pulpit the sacred words of the redemption of their country, and of the damnation in hell of the Vatican. He will then have, in the first place, the entire approbation of his own conscience, and, secondly, the approbation and gratitude of millions of men. Revive the ancient Christianity which preaches self-denial, mutual forgiveness, and the holy doctrine of the equality of men. It is on these conditions we can receive you as brethren.

Sickened and shocked I was shown into the drawing room, and there, with her perfumed cambric handkerchief, steeped in tears, lay the tortured turkey's sensitive mistress on a sofa, reading a novel. That poor calves regularly undergo this blanching process is well known, but who could imagine that turkeys were doomed to the same amount of cruelty, and this at the hand of a woman?—[William Howitt.]
