Harmony, therefore, between us, if you wish it, but act we I; bitherto you have acted ill. You have made all kinds of produce taken. Rome a den of wild beasts, thirsting for the destruction of Italy. I am unhappily convinced that you cannot save the cardinals ever, cry to the four winds of heaven that you will have no compa ionship with the wicked; that you are Italians; that you will at least imitate the priestho d of Hungary, of Poland, of Greece, of China, of the savages of Ameibat - together with them for the independ nce of their country. Let the Italian priest launch forth from the pulpit the sacred words for Lumber. of the redemption of their coun ry, and of the damnation in hell of the Vatican. He will then have, in the first place, the entire approbation of his own consci nce, and, seclions of men. Revive the ancient Christianity which preclaims self-denial, mutual forgiveness, and the holy doctrine of the equality of men. It is on these conditions we can receive you as brethren.
