Wired from Washington.

WASHINGTON, 13.—Before the resumption of regular proceedings in the Hill investigation, Coleman presented a formal communication calling attention to the promise of Secretary Folger that he would cause the attendance before the committee of any person in Government employ, and would send the committee to distant cities to take testimony if needed.

The President has appointed Byron Andrews, of Washington, William H. Bridgman, of Stamford, Conn., and Dudley F. Phelps, of New York City, a commission to examine and report upon 25 miles of the Northern Pacific line, to the Missouri Division, Montana.

In the case of Mary Jane and Charles Stitt, of Louisiana, against the Missouri Pacific, Judge James West, Judge James to-day granted an injunction restraining defendant from disposing of 100 bonds of \$1,000 each of the New Orleans, Baton Rouge and Vicksburg, which it was claimed belong to plaintiffs. West admitting that the bonds had been in his possession, and that he had borrowed money on them, the court said it felt bound to make this order until the final hearing.

St. Louis, 13.—At 8 this evening a heavy wind and rain storm passed over the local country, causing considerable damage on land and river. The tow boat *Charley Bowen* with the barge *Red Wing* was blown from her moorings at the foot of Boshart street, and driven ashore above the bridge. She is sunk; her bows were stove in. The barge struck one of the piers and sank; valued at \$3,000; insured \$5,000.

Chicago, 13.—A large number of persons were killed by a cyclone and a canal boat belonging in Chicago were blown from one of the lumber yards in the Northern part of the city across the river. Both vessels were destroyed.

Verona, 13.—A raft containing 900,000 feet of boards and a raft of half a million feet of logs were driven from their moorings and floated down the river. The bridge and broke in four places; five men on it narrowly escaping drowning. Three tug boats were sent after the raft, with the exception of the city council of unroofing the Missouri Pacific freight house and the Illinois Asylum and numerous minor injuries.

Council Bluffs, 13.—Special to the *Advertiser* from McPaul, Plumbo Hollow, Peoria and Hamburg on the K. C. road, in Fremont County, reported that a terrible lightning cyclone and terrible hail storm that visited that section at 12 o'clock today. Owing to damage of a telegraph, particulars are meagre. It is reported that the damage was done buildings and crops.

A large two-story brick schoolhouse was demolished, and several houses blown down, one of which was a family of five.

Yelov, 13.—A special from Yelov, 13, reports that a terrible lightning cyclone and terrible hail storm that visited that section at 12 o'clock today. Owing to damage of a telegraph, particulars are meagre. It is reported that the damage was done buildings and crops.

Des Moines, 13.—A special from Marquette Station, on the Rock Island, reported that a man named Frank Hallock was fatally shot. There is great excitement throughout the State, 200 men are on the alert, and the police are on the watch for the murderer. The man was shot by a man named Hallock, who was a professional burglar.
