ROBBERY.—On Saturday afternoon,

about 4 o'clock, a thief entered through a window, the house of Mr. L. P. Richards, in the 14th Ward, and, forcibly opening a door, stole therefrom a chair, earthenware, and a set of tools—all of gold. At the time he entered the house, the family were absent and the doors locked; but while he was securing his plunder, Mrs. Richards entered the place by the front door. She saw the robber, but could not distinguish his features; and, becoming frightened, ran from the house. As soon as he found himself observed, the thief started from the room and escaped, carrying with him the jewelry.

These facts becoming known to

the police, they began working up the case; and yesterday they arrested on suspicion a man named Aaron Fosburgh. Fosburgh was concerned in some robberies here about eighteen months ago, and was sentenced to the penitentiary.

The term of his confinement had

recently expired; and the vigilant police immediately conceived the idea that he had participated in the robbery of Mr. Richards' house. After his arrest they obtained a search warrant for the purpose of looking through the Washington House, where Fosburgh resides. This morning they were rewarded by finding not only the jewelry heretofore mentioned, but also several hundred dollars worth of watches, chains, rings, etc., all of which have recently been stolen.

In a flour sack in the interior of

the building they found half a dozen barroom silver spoons, owner unknown. Outside, hidden away in an out-house and near a wall, they discovered three boxes containing one silver and four gold watches, with chains, several rings, one small pistol, two breast-plates, one locket, and several little articles of value.

Two of the watches, two rings,

one breast-plate, and the locket were stolen last week from Mrs. Wilford Woodruff's house. One watch and some other articles were taken from the house of Mrs. De Saules.

Of the jewelry stolen from the

three places mentioned, the police had information; but they have recovered several things which are yet unclaimed. The case is set to be heard by Judge Pyper at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

THE RACES.—The exhibition races

at Agricultural Park, on Saturday afternoon, were witnessed by a very large concourse of people. All who attended, with the exception of a few pool buyers, were delighted with the appearance and speed of the renowned horses. The first race was between "Adelaide," bay mare, and "Calmar," bay gelding, three years old, in five furlongs and mile. The first heat was won by "Calmar" 2.52; the second, third and fourth by "Adelaide," in 2.50, 2.50 and 2.51.

During the intervals between

the heats of the foregoing races, "Ramus" bay gelding, and "Sweetser," grey gelding, took the track. In the first heat between these two horses, "Ramus" made the mile in 2.51, distancing "Sweetser," who had broken badly. At this time some objections to a further trial of the pair were raised by pool-buyers who had staked their money on slow time. They contended that a match between the two horses had been announced; and, inasmuch as the grey horse had been distanced the race was ended. The directors acceded to their demand to the extent of withdrawing "Sweetser;" and in the second heat, "Ramus" was accompanied by a training horse, kindly loaned by Mr. Gardner. Mr. Spilan appeared to be somewhat vexed at the disturbance created, but he drove the trotter on time, and made a double circuit of the half-mile track in 2.19. This, of course, is the best record ever made in Utah; and is the more remarkable from the fact that the track was heavy, and that the horse previously going at a 2.18 had broken in the last quarter, thereby losing nearly two seconds.

Following this heat and just be-

fore the last heat of the race between "Adelaide" and "Calmar," Mr. Spilan being desirous of giving the public all that had been promised them, drove "Sweetser" alone in 2.54. The slow time was occasioned by the rarity of the atmosphere, which seriously affected the pacer. He no sooner could get his speed than he lost his feet.

At the Tabernacle.—The congregation

at the Tabernacle, yesterday afternoon, was highly edified by an excellent discourse from Elder Orson Pratt. With the good attention manifested by the audience, generally, we regret to be compelled to mention some imprudences that were painfully noticeable. A number of young people were observed to leave the building during the service, thus showing the evidences of bad education in this respect. Persons who cannot remain in the house of God during the little season that God's services are being performed, would much better remain at home, for by taking the latter course they would not only spare others great annoyance, but would also spare themselves the objects of the pity and contempt that their actions inspire.
