Withdraws Committee Amendments on Bacon, Lard, Etc., House Rates Enough.

ROOT ATTACKS FRUIT TRUST

Stys California Fruit Growers' Association is Not an Incorporation of Angels.

Washington, May 31,-Agreements were reached in the senate today upon many sections of the tariff bill, the paragraphs relating to agriculture were nearly all disposed of."

During the afternoon Mr. Bacon entered upon an extended discussion of the proposed increase over the rates of the house bill on duties on bacon and hams, lard, fresh beef, ctc. Mr. Aldrich surprised the senate by with drawing the committee amendments, saying he believed the house rates, al-though below the Dingley law rates, were protective.

RAYNER AS A HUMORIST.

This action provoked further discusfavored the higher rates. Senator Ray-ner created considerable amusement by a humorous description of what Sen-ator Aldrich hadreferred to as the "cita-del of protection" and Senator Smith of Michigan advocated a free tarig or or Michigan advocated a free drift of a fariff for revenue only. More than two hours were consumed by a debate on the question of increasing the duty on lemons from 1½ to 2 costs a pound and after carnest apposition by Mr. Root the increase recommended by the committee was sustained 45 to 25 committee was sustained, 45 to 28

Among other duties affected was that on dried pears, which was reduced from 30 to 25 cents per bushel. The duties on chicory root, chocolate, and cocoa were reduced, as was that on salt, from 12 to 10 cents per 100 pounds in bags, and from 10 to 8 cents per 190 pounds in

Stout, ale, beer and porter were given an increase of duty from 40 to 45 cents when in bottles, eac., and from 20 to 25 cents per gallon when in bulk. The house duty on bacon and hams, and on lard, was restored upon motion of Mr. Aldrich who withdraw the com-

the paragraph relating to fresh beef, mutton, etc., in order to decrease the duties on that article was defeated.

Senators wore very sour looks as they entered the senate chamber be-cause of having to meet on a legal holiday that most of them had usually devoted to exercises in commemoration of the day. As soon as the tariff bill was taken up, consideration of the parwas taken up, consideration of the par-agraph on lemons was resumed and Senator Flint proceeded to defend the amendment proposed by the committee on finance, which increases the duty to 1½ cents per pound. A roll call being demanded, only 48 senators one more than a quorum an-

senators, one more than a quorum, answered to their names.

LEMONS FOR LEMONS.

"Without the competition of Cali-fornia growers on the New York mar-yet the price of lemons will increase," said Mr. Flint. The small duty asked for this industry, he said, amounted on small sizes of lemons to 1 cent a dozen and without this protection against lemons from Sicily, he argued the lemons from Sicily, he argued, the lemon industry of California would be wiped out. Its destruction, he asserted, would immediately cause the price of lemons in New York to advance \$1 a box, as the price of the foreign sup-ply was only kept down by the com-petition of the American product,

This came as a surprise and Mr. Ald-rich explained that he had taken this rich explained that he had taken this action because he wanted to curtail the debate and did not believe the lower duty provided by the house would af-fect the importations.

ALDRICH SURPRISES HEYBURN. Senator Beveridge indicated that he approved this course. Mr. Heyburn ex-pressed surprise that such action should be contemplated and said he had sup-posed these amendments restoring the duties of the Dingley law, which had been lowered by the house, would be maintained by the committee on finance. "If I believed," said Mr. Aldrich.

ALDRICH EXPLAINS.

"I have no question about that whatever," said Mr. Aldrich. "I am not failing in my duty as a protectionist in making this change. At 4 cents a pound making this change. At 4 cents a pound there is no danger of any large impor-tations of bacon and ham in this coun-try. When the Wilson bill was in op-eration, with a duty of 9 cents a pound, there were no importations. There is no possibility that there will be large importations of lard under a duty of 1½ cents a pound, as fixed by the house. There was no increase in those importa-tions under the Wilson bill."

year the lemon growers of California have made an average profit of \$530 per acre with expenditures amounting to \$370. That was under the present tariff.

"I would not eliminate the lemon growers of California or other Ameri-can industry, but it is a little too much for them to come here and ask an increase of duty when they are already making over 100 per cent." Mr. Root having referred to the Cali-

fornia fruit growers' association, Mr. Flint asked if it was not an association of farmers.

The cotton schedule being reached, Mr. Aldrich said it was not his purpose to take up that schedule at this time. Notwithstanding this statement Mr. Smith of South Carolina made an elab-orate speech on that subject, taking 'It is not an incorporation of angels. and if it gets control of our market and you put up a barrier against the foreign lemon the white winged farm-ers of the California fruit growers" as-sociation may yield to the temptation to get the highest price that they can for their product."

AN ACRID DEBATE.

As the debate on lemons proceeded the wordy exchange bewteen senators became acrid. 'Does the senator believe that state-
