### NO JURY TRIALS IN PHILIPPINES.

Ninety Per Cent of the People Are Too Ignorant for the Duty-

SO TESTIFIES GOV. TAFT.

Would Not Like Responsibility of Putting Any Part of Archipelago Under Control of Native Troops,

Washington, Feb. 14 .- Gov. Taft of the Philippines today continued his statement before the senate committee on the Philippines concerning the islands in that archipelago with the intention of discussing the degree of tranquility in the pacific provinces, which, he said, included all the provinces except Tabayas, Samar and Batangas.

Senator Lodge asked as to the means for maintaining tranquility. The reply involved a review of the legal system of the islands at present as under the military government, and also under the Spanish rule.

der the Spanish rule. Gov. Taft said that in June of last year the commission had passed an act organizing a system of judiciary for the entire archipelago, creating a supreme court and seven justices, and jourteen districts. On the supreme court bench there are, he said, three ratios and four Americans, and he natives and four Americans, and he believed that any state would be satbelieved that any state would be sat-ished with such a bench.
