THE MINNESOTA CONFERENCE

The Minnesota Conference convened at Monticello, Wright County, Minn., April 19, 1884, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Elders from Utah present: J. E. Booth, of the Presidency of the North-western States Mission; Heber Bennion, President of the Conference, and Neils L. Lund, Charles M. Nielson, Peter Loutsenock, T. S. Woodland, A. B. Strickland, Mads Andersen, G. L. Breinholt, Morton Jensen, Soren Christensen, Neils Bengtson, Jas. H. Fillmore, Geo. A. Cloward, Harry A. Young, Lewis Anderson, Canute W. Petersen, Chas. W. Hopkins, Ferdinand Clark and Wm. R. Stowell and Geo. W. Riggs, Presiding Elder of Monticello Branch.

Prayer was offered by Elder A. B. Strickland. President J. E. Booth made a few opening remarks; called upon the El-

ders to report their different fields of labor and stated that Elder Joseph M. Jensen not being quite well, was unable to attend our Conference.

Elders P. Loutsenock and N. L. Lund had been laboring mostly in Brown County, since our last Conference. They had not been able to obtain many houses to preach in, but had done considerable traveling from house to house and bore their testimony to the people. They felt confident that a few would embrace the truth in the near future. There had been one baptism.

Elder C. M. Nielsen felt pleased to state that the Lord had blessed his labor although he had met with some opposition. He had labored in Wisconsin since last Conference. Held some twenty-six meetings, and eleven had been added to the church by baptism. Several were investigating the gospel.

Elders A. B. Strickland and T. S. Woodland had been laboring in Sterns County since last fall. Had been able to hold but one meeting, but had visited from house to house, and offered them the principles of life and salvation. A few were investigating our doctrines.

Elder L. Andersen made a few appropriate remarks.

President J. E. Booth said he was very much pleased with the reports of the Elders, gave some good counsel in regard to the best course to pursue in promulgating the Gospel. He spoke upon the subject of the Priesthood, and proved from the Scriptures that no man can act in it, without being called of God as was Aaron; bore his testimony to the restoration of the Priesthood in these the latter days.

Opened with prayer by Elder P. Loutsenock.

Elder H. Bennion reported his field of labor. He had been traveling together with Elder J. M. Jensen in Wright, Meeker and partly in Blue Earth Counties. They had held several meetings and visited a number of their old friends, who seems to be very much pleased to see them. They had also visited La Crosse, Wisconsin and held a few meetings together with Elder Neilson, and baptized three persons. Several seems to be investigating the Gospel, but found considerable prejudice against the truth.

Elder Lewis Anderson spoke upon the first principles of the gospel.

Prest. J. E. Booth delivered an able gospel discourse; referred to the promise of the Savior in regard to the signs that should follow the true believers of the gospel; bore testimony to the establishment of the kingdom of God in fulfillment of the predictions of the ancient prophets.

7 p. m.

Opened with prayer by Elder N. Bengtson.

Elders G. A. Cloward, S. Christiansen and J. H. Fillmore bore a faithful testimony to the truthfulness of the work in which we are engaged.

Elders C. W. Peterson and M. Jensen said, if it were not for the knowledge they possessed with regard to the divinity of this work, they would not have left their families and friends; expressed their desire to go ahead and do the best they can to warn their fellow-men.

President Booth gave some instructions to the Elders.

Prayer by Elder Wm. R. Stowell. Elder Geo. W. Riggs represented the Monticello Branch as being in a pretty good condition.

President Booth said he had visited La Crosse, Wis., on his way up to this place, and arranged for the emigration of a small company of Saints for Utah, after which he accompanied Elder Nielson to Anoka County, where they held two meetings, and baptized two persons. Another family is investigating the Gospel. Also baptized one in this place.

Elders F. Clark and H. A. Young bore a faithful testimony to the divinity of the work.

Elder H. Bennion preached on the restoration of the Gospel and setting up of the Kingdom of God in the latter-days.

Prayer by Elder M. Anderson. The sacrament was administered by Elders Bennion and Lund.

Prest. J. E. Booth delivered a powerful discourse upon the persecution and opposition we meet as messengers of the Everlasting Gospel. He said it was no use for the Christian world to slander and abuse our Elders for if we are false prophets, as the world term us, our condemnation will be great enough to endure in the world to come. We are constantly proving to the world that we are sincere and have the salvation of the souls of men at heart, for we leave our families and friends and all that is near and dear to us, and travel without purse or scrip like the Apostles of old and preach the Gospel of Christ.

Elder W. R. Stowell bore testimony to the remarks that had been made and referred to some of his experience in the church.

Elder C. W. Nielsen represented the general authorities of the church as sustained at the last General Conference at Salt Lake City, and also Wm. M. Palmer as President of the North-western States Mission and J. E. Booth, his assistant; H. Bennion as

President of the Conference and M. Anderson his successor, Charles M. Nielsen, Clerk of Conference and C. W. LOCAL NEWS.

FROM MONDAY'S DAILY, APRIL 29.

The Lecture.—In Pere Hyacinthe lecture last night, which was most devoted to Polygamy, he expressed substantially the same views on the subject as given by him in his interview with a representative of the News on Saturday.

The Clawson Case.—On Saturday Elder Rudger Clawson, indicted for polygamy by the Grand Jury, appeared before the District Court and asked until Monday to plead, as he had no had time to consult with his attorney. The request was granted. This morning the defendant was again before the Court with F. S. Richards, Esq., for counsel, and was granted another extension until Wednesday.

President's Party.—A telegram from President Taylor to President Joseph F. Smith, dated at St. George, on Saturday, states that the party would leave there this morning, hold meeting at Leeds, and then go to Toquerville to hold meetings to-night and Tuesday. Wednesday they will beat Kanarra, Thursday at Rush Lake, Friday they will reach Milford, and be home Saturday morning. They held meetings in St. George, Saturday and yesterday. All were well.

Sudden Death.—On Saturday last Bishop Thomas Cutler, of Lehi, was in this city, and while here received a dispatch informing him that Brother W. H. Winn, his Counselor, was dangerously ill, and requesting him to send a physician to Lehi as quickly as possible. Thirty minutes later the Bishop received another dispatch informing him that Brother Winn had expired. He had only been ill about thirty hours, the cause of death being inflammation of the bowels. Elder Winn was much respected in the community where he resided, on account of his sterling integrity. He was also a man of more than ordinary intelligence.

The Hopt Case.—The attention of the District Court was occupied nearly the whole of to-day with the case of the People vs. Frederick Hopt alias Welcome, arraigned on a charge of murder, this being the third trial of the accused. A motion for postponement of trial until next term was argued by the defendant's counsel, on the ground of poverty of the defendant and inability so far to procure certain witnesses necessary to the case.

The District Attorney said the defense had now lasted four years, and that the plea of poverty was as good at the commencement of the trial as it was now, and might be thirty years hence. That so far as the witnesses named were concerned, they could just as well have been procured at the first trial as now, and yet it was evident that no proper effort had been made then or in the meantime by any one concerned to secure their attendance.

For the defense it was urged that considerable difficulty had been experienced in procuring the witnesses, they were so scattered; that it had been impossible to subpoena them in time for the present trial; and that so far as the four years mentioned by the prosecution went, they were nothing in proving a man's guilt or innocence.

Chief Justice Hunter, in the course of his decision on the motion, said that the defendant had had two trials, and that in the plea for delay, it must be shown not only that due diligence had been exercised in the interval in regard to the desired attendance of the witnesses mentioned in the plea, but that they were indispensable to the defense, which did not appear to be the case. The motion was therefore refused and the trial proceeded, the empaneling of the jury being next in order, which had not been completed up to last accounts.

The Immigrants. The company of immigrants in charge of President C. D. Fjeldsted, arrived in this city at 8.45 a. m. to-day. President Fjeldsted, who called in with Elder Peter Sundwall this forenoon, informs us that they had an exceedingly prosperous journey by sea and land, with but one accident happening to mar the record. This occurred in mid-ocean. A little four-year-old son of Martha Pratt, named Thomas, got hold of a bottle of brandy, obtained for medicinal purposes, and drank about two wine-glassfuls of the
