# THE AMERICAN SOCIETY OF EQUITY

Becomes Affiliated in a Limited Degree, With the Federation of Labor.

HAS OVER MILLION MEMBERS.

Repeal of the Tariff on All Steel Trust Products Demanded by Resolutions.

Minneapolis, Nov. 15.—Embodying a membership of over a million, claiming to represent more than one-seventh of the entire population of the country, the American Society of Equity, the recently formed National Farmers' union, today became affiliated in a limited degree with the American Federation of Labor, now in convention here.

After a discussion as to ways and means between the representatives of the farmers and a committee appointed by President Gompers, the committee reported that the only practical action at this time in furthering the interests of each is the co-operation of both, the committee urging a call upon wage workers still outside the fold of the unions to affiliate with them, and recommending that all members of the federation demand products of the farm, garden and orchard that bear the union label of the farmers' organization, since the farmers through their representatives have made assurances that they will not purchase anything but union made goods.

To the end of carrying into effect a mutual understanding, the committee presented a resolution to the effect that local unions and central bodies appoint committees to co-operate in the effort to promote the demand for union labeled goods and that the exchange of delegates be continued.

The committee's report in its entirety was adopted after some discussion by the convention late this afternoon. J. N. Bell of England, fraternal delegate of the British Trades union congress to the convention of the American Federation of Labor, addressed the convention today.

Resolutions offered by the delegates of the Seamen's International union (which ships flying the American flag, which ship Chinese cooks, seamen, etc., suffer from even, "chained" newsboys' union, better wages on government contracts, repeal of the tariff on all steel trust products, and reorganization of the meat cutters and butchers, are urged in other resolutions.

# ALCOHOL WORSE THAN DREAD TUBERCULOSIS.

New York, Nov. 15.—The contention that alcohol is beneficial in treating tuberculosis was declared to be fallacious by Dr. T. D. Crothers of Hartford, Conn., at the international congress on tuberculosis today. He declared that, upon the contrary, alcohol is really more dangerous than the disease it is given to cure.

Miss Emily Noble of California offered practical suggestions for the prevention of the spread of tuberculosis among children.

"I had the good fortune in 1900 to be sent from San Francisco to Madras to make certain investigations on light and X-ray treatment with a great deal of machinery and apparatus," said she. "I found that in India, with a population of 400,000,000, the children are singularly free from tuberculosis because they are taught to breathe properly as a daily exercise. And this is in a country where there is great poverty and a great scarcity of water."
