POLICE IDENTIFY BRUSH AS MURDERER ANDREWS

Berkeley, Cul., Oct. 13.—The man known locally as William Brush, or Curtis, who, with a woman companion, is wanted for robbery and attack up-on William Ellis, the Australian sport-ing man, in this city on Wernesedoy, last, has been identified by the police as Milton Franklin Andrews, wanted for the alleged murder of Bessie Bouton, on Mount Culler, Colo. on Oct. 5, 1904. The detectives say that the identifica-tion is so, positive as to admit of no doubt.

doubt, The minute descriptions furnished by Ellis of his assainant taily exactly with those sent broadcast over the nontry last year of one who is known to have been with Bessie Bouton short-ly before her body was found. Andrews traveled under the diases of George Bennet and Milton Franklin, and it now appears that he has added the names of Brush and Cartis to his list.
