No Clue to Postoffice Burglars-Sent to Asylum-District Court Notes-Will Not Purchase Bond.

Provo, April 19 .- The threatened litigation over the waters of Utah lake and Jordan river was commenced in earnest with the filing of the suit of the Sult Lake City Water and Electrical Power company against the Utah lake commission, Salt Lake City and the several canal companies which take water out of the Jordan river above the headgates of the power company,

The issuing of a temporary Injunetion by Judge Booth was detailed in last evening's "News."

The plaintiffs in a very lengthy com-plaint set forth that under their arti-cles of incorporation they have au-thority to acquire, own and operate canals, flumes, water power plants and complying with all the necessary requirements in posting and filing noless of appropriation, they acquired he right to one-sixth of the entire fordan river on Dec. 11, 1897, and that

forder river on Dec. II, 1897, and that said river is a public stream and the only outlet of Utah lake.

The use of said river by plaintiff being to divert the water from the Jorian river at or near the county line between Sait Lake and Utah counties. at the head gates of what is known as the Utah and Sait Lake Canal, and to flow the water down the said Utah and Sait Lake canal to the power creating plant of plaintiff, which is erected on or tear the line between lots 6 and 7 of section 15, township 4 south of range west. Salt Lake meridian, and to use and thereafter returning the same to the Jordan river. The said power croatien plant is constructed to use more han said one-sixth flow at a maximum

of its capacity. of its capacity.

The complaint alleges that by means of dams the defendants entirely shut off the natural flow of the river one mile above plaintiff's head gates for the purpose of storing the water in Utah lake during flood season to use during the irrigating season. The plaintiff further allegon that the defendants for more than seven years last past from the end of the irrigating season during the en-tire winter season and until such time as the irrigation season begins in each subsequent year have not attempted to impede or restrict the natural flow of one-sixth of the river, which plaintiff. acquired the right to use. The one-sixth of the water can flow without limiting the quantity of water required

by defendants.
