

## SCHOOL TEACHERS RATES TO EAST

Special Inducements Given to  
Tourists Next Month.

### S. P. ASSISTANT CONDUCTORS

Some Changes on Passenger Runs on  
The Salt Lake Division Go  
Into Effect.

The Oregon Short Line and the Rio Grande Western announce special rates to Chicago, St. Louis, St. Paul and other points, effective May 5, 6, June 4-5 and 9-10, with a return limit good until September 8. In addition there is some talk of putting in a transit time limit, both going and coming, of ten days. The Sebastian form of ticket will be used and the fare from Salt Lake will be on the basis of a single fare for the round trip plus \$2. This rate is put in for the special benefit of the school teachers and will undoubtedly be generally patronized.

### MOFFAT SCORES. Power Company Thrown Out of Gore Canyon for Good.

Denver, April 15.—The attempt to block the building of the Moffat road through the Gore Canyon was defeated today by the refusal of the state land board to rescind the lease granted the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific railway. The new Century Light & Power company claimed to have a prior right to the land in question and applied to have the case reopened. By unanimous vote the board declared "that owing to the great benefit to be derived from the building of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific road, we, the commissioners, cannot afford to block the building by refusing the right of way through Gore canyon."

### OGDEN CHANGES.

### Southern Pacific Takes Ten Conductors Away From City.

Yesterday there were some changes that went into effect on the passenger runs out of Ogden on the Southern Pacific when the terminals were changed to Carlin, Ogden and Reno, and the runs from Reno to Carlin and from Carlin to Ogden. With the change came the transfer to the west end of the Salt Lake division of 11 passenger conductors who have made their homes in Ogden.

On the same day the order went into effect which established the position of train agent or assistant conductor on the Southern Pacific passenger train. This order was productive of 19 promotions from the ranks of the passenger brakemen and the advancement of a like number of freight men to fill the vacancies formed.

To Visit Los Angeles.  
Senator W. A. Clark is reported as having finished up his business in New York and is now on his way to visit his copper properties in Arizona prior to arriving in Los Angeles on or about April 25, when he will meet with J. Ross Clark, T. E. Gibbons and other officers of the San Pedro.

Wool is Being Held.  
Agent Potter of the Erie Despatch, who is looking after the interests of the company in Utah, while Mr. Vincent is holding down the wool situation in Idaho, has returned from a trip to Black Rock and Milford, where sheeping operations are now in full swing. He reports that there are no sales as yet as the woolmen are holding off at prices that range from 14 to 15 cents per

pound. Mr. Potter says that the market of affairs seems to be out of all reason.

### Surveying West.

Denver, April 15.—Surveying of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific railroad (the Moffat short line) west of Steamboat Springs has commenced. In a brief report received to day the chief engineer says he has found a most favorable route from Steamboat Springs, and that there will be practically no engineering obstacles to overcome.

### Loading of Wool.

The Denver Post is the authority for the statement that lines east of Chicago have notified freight representatives in Denver that they must not load wool this season. Incidentally the Post claims the victory only save Western freight men, but concedes that Milton Knight, freight traffic manager of the Wabash, and J. A. Munroe, freight traffic manager of the Union Pacific, have been active in bringing about this reform in wool shipments.

### SPIKE AND RAIL.

General Passenger Agent Hooper of the Rio Grande system is expected to arrive in Salt Lake on Saturday morning.

The Rock Island announces the putting on of a new sleeping car service out of Colorado Springs. Commercial Agent Williams of the Milwaukee is down south. Traveling Freight Agent Kyles is in Idaho, and Contracting Agent McKellar is in Wyoming.

The party of Raymond-Whitcomb excursionists, 75 strong, got east over the Rio Grande on a special at 6:30 this evening. Frank Groesbeck is mourning the loss of his imported pedigree collie pup, recently acquired at great expense. The dog is a black one with a full white collar and white tins. As he has offered a reward for its return a piece of twine with a small ball at one end and a yellow dog at the other is making life a burden to him.

Suit to Foreclose Mortgage.  
Henry K. Higson filed suit in the district court today against J. Frank Pickering and wife to foreclose a mortgage on certain real estate in this city given to secure the payment of a promissory note for \$2,500 and interest, dated October 17, 1901. The property involved is part of lot 4, block 15, plat B. The total amount of judgment asked is \$2,493.70 and interest at 6 per cent from Jan. 27, 1903, and \$100 as attorneys fees.

### COURT NOTES.

Suit was filed in the district court today by Lillie E. Clark against B. F. Redman to collect a total of \$1,109.14, alleged to be due on two promissory notes given by defendant on March 15, 1901.

Architect Dallas is completing the working plans of new branch National building for Cedar City, and will be ready in five days to receive bids. The building will be 62x100 feet, three stories and divided up into class rooms and laboratories, and an auditorium 60x74 feet. The material will be buff, or Milwaukee brick, and white stone. The architect says it will be the finest building in the southern part of the state.

Work was resumed this afternoon on the new Holmes apartment building, corner of State and South Temple streets, and the great building will be under cover before snow flies again. The delay has been occasioned by the inability to get structural iron and steel before this time.

The relief that will be experienced in this state when the Colorado Fuel & Iron company get to turning out structural iron and steel is illustrated by the fact that a Utah manufacturer placed a large order for steel in a few days after he received word that part of his order had been shipped and the rest would be later on. The Utah manufacturer wanted the entire order, and stated that what had been shipped would be held subject to the order of the eastern master.

Judge Powers has returned from a brief vacation on the Pacific coast, where he says he saw more Salt Lake people than in any other city. He went for recreation, safety, and a good view of all the courts and law offices. He witnessed the savory attractions of Chinatown, and went fishing in San Francisco bay. The judge neglected to bring a seine along with him, so his catch did not amount to much.

The little one had been ill for but a short time and its death was sudden and unexpected, and a great sorrow to its parents. The funeral will be held from the family residence tomorrow, Friday, at 1 p. m. Friends are invited.

The season's hand concerts have begun at Fort Douglas, and are being given every other day at 3 p. m.

The party of 130 Raymond & Whitcomb excursionists who are spending the day in the city were given to the Tabernacle this morning, where they were treated to an organ recital by Miss Coray, who handled the great instrument very well. The regular organist, Prof. McClellan, is now on his way to Denver.

Miss Beattie Knoche, the sleeping girl in the Holy Cross hospital, was reported slightly improved today.

Representative Barrett continues in a critical condition at St. Mark's hospital.

Eleven Salt Lake "hello" girls left tonight for Butte, under the direction of General Manager Murray. The occasion of the exodus is the strike of the telephone girls in Butte, and the Salt Lake girls are going to fill the place of the strikers. The Butte girls organized a union some time ago, and demanded concessions which the company would not see fit to give. Mr. Murray will remain north until that is restored.

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## MINE IS SOLD FOR \$500,000

Property the Eagle and Blue Bell  
Of Tintic District.

### BINGHAM CON., PURCHASER.

The Transfer is on the Basis of \$2 a Share—Silver-Lead and First Class.

Unless the unexpected happens a control of the Eagle and Blue Bell mine of Tintic will pass into the hands of Capt. Duncan McViehe, for the Bingham Consolidated Mining company within the next few hours. While the agreements had not all been signed up at press time it was stated that a meeting would be held later in the day at which all arrangements would be concluded for the formal transfer.

An option has been in existence for some weeks for a majority of the stock. The basis upon which the deal is being made is at the rate of \$2 per share, or \$500,000 for the entire property, the capitalization being 250,000 shares. The Eagle and Blue Bell mine is one of the best mines in the Tintic district, and by men who claim to know it thoroughly is said that the purchasers are getting it at a low figure.

The Bingham Con. needs the class of ores produced by the mine to blend with those from its Bingham properties. Jackson McChrysal and brother have been among the heaviest shareholders in the Tintic property. It is said that the first payment to be made will amount to \$10,000 and that the balance is to come soon. Captain McViehe and a crowd of experts recently made a thorough examination of the mine.
