OLD ARM CHAIR DID IT.

Alvaro A. Pratt Forced Into Bankruptcy Over Resort Proposition.

The venture of Alvaro A. Pratt as founder and manager of the Old Arm Chair summer resort in a fork of Parley's canyon came to a termination yesterday in the United States court. Pratt filed a petition to be adjudged a bankrupt, and it was referred to Referee Baldwin. His debts amount to \$4,452.45 all, or mostly all incurred in the management of the place. As security the land on which the resort is located was twice mortgaged and then sold in payment for a lumber bill. The mortgages and sale secure \$1,175 of the debt, while \$3,277 is unsecured. The largest debtors are Peart & Co., for groceries delivered, \$9,000; Granite Lumber Co., for materials, \$850, and the Utah Savings company loan on a note, \$200. The remaining items are made up of loans, wages due, and merchandise bills.

Pratt founded the resort five years ago. The canyon fork was then a wilderness of brush, through which a small stream ran to the main canyon. He made extensive improvements, ran a road up to the snow line, and built a number of cottages in a mountain valley at the top of the canyon. He hopes to sell the land in small plots for summer homes for those who desire a cool spot near the city. For the amount of money spent on the place, the indebtedness, which sent it into bankruptcy is comparatively small.
