BRIGHAM CITY.

SESSION OF DISTRICT COURT.

Two Important Decisions by Judge Maughan-Holiday Benefactions. pecial Correspondence

Special Correspondence.

Brigham City, Jan 1.—The district court was in session here this week. Besides disposing of a number of minor cases, Judge W. W. Maughan rendered two important decisions deciding cases which had been pending for some time. The first was the case of William Jensen against the Boxelder Academy of Music and Dancing. In this action plaintiff sought to foreclose three mortgages, aggregating \$8,000. This was concested by W. H. Boothes, intervenor in a second mortgage, on the ground that the board of directors had no right to buy stock from stock-

intervenor in a second mortgage, on the ground that the board of directors had no right to buy stock from stockholders and give a mortgage or mortgages to cover the purchase price. The court found that where there are no creditors such buying may be done; also that Boothes and Peirce were owners of 2,000 shares of stock, and not creditors. The court ordered the foreclosure of all mortgages.

The other case was that of the Three-Mile Creek Land & Livestock company vs. Thomas C. Young. The court ruled in favor of plaintiff. Mr. Young had made application in the state engineer's office to use water issuing from a spring on the land belonging to the company, which had been awarded by the engineer after being contested. The company then instituted suit to quiet title to the water and set aside the decision of the state engineer. The trial lasted four days and resulted in a victory for the company on two points. The first point is the principle of priority of application: the second point is that where a party owns land upon which water springs and percolates without flowing beyond the boundaries of the land, it belongs to the landholder.
