

RAINEY DID NOT ATTACK CANAL

But He Proposes to Expose and Denounce All Kinds of Graft In Connection With It.

HE ANSWERS REP. LOVERING.

Burton of Ohio Made Hot Reply but Was Compelled to Withdraw Part of His Remarks.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Asserting that his recent speech in the house relative to the purchase by the United States government of the Panama canal had brought upon himself "vilification, misrepresentation and abuse almost without a parallel in the history of that body," Representative Rainey of Illinois today delivered in the house of representatives a lengthy speech in reply to the charges that the information upon which his remarks were based was obtained from "ex-convicts and black-malicious." This accusation had been made openly in the house by Representative Lovering of Massachusetts.

"True loyalty to this great enterprise," Representative Rainey said, "demands that you must expose and denounce all kinds of graft in connection with it, in order to avoid the pitfalls in which the French companies fell, and I propose to do this whether it meets with the approval of the next president of the United States or not."

"I want to say to all those who are spending so much time abusing me that I have not yet commenced this fight. I have only trained my guns on some of the least objectionable features in connection with Panama matters."

DID NOT ATTACK CANAL

Representative Rainey declares that he did not attack the canal, but simply attacked the graft connected with the enterprise. He asserted that Representative Lovering had not attempted to deny a single fact he had stated, but, after making his charges, proceeded to vilify William Nelson Cromwell.

"I never heard until he made his speech that any persons were trying to get Mr. Cromwell to purchase any alleged evidence of the guilt of Mr. Cromwell," he said. "I knew nothing of any attempts to sell any story to the Democratic national committee until the gentleman made his speech on this floor."

Mr. Rainey further stated that in the evidence he produced in supporting his charge of graft in connection with the buying of the canal, nearly all was obtained from Panama. Then, after making his charges, proceeded to vilify William Nelson Cromwell.

"The attack I made was entirely unexpected, and the next attack I make upon these gentlemen will be just as entirely unexpected by them when it comes."

Mr. Cromwell, in the speech made by him through Mr. Olcott of New York, has seen fit to discuss his present efforts to conclude a treaty between Colombia and Panama, in which he refers to the necessity for some contribution from Panama to Colombia as her proportion of the public debt of Colombia.

CROMWELL TREATIES.

Referring to these as the "proposed Cromwell treaties," Mr. Rainey asserted that Mr. Cromwell proposed to change the Hay-Bunau-Varilla treaty as to impose upon this country an additional burden of \$1,500,000.

"And he proposes that this sum shall be taken from the treasury and paid, not to Panama, but to Colombia," he said. "In addition to that, he proposes that for five years after 1913 the \$250,000 we agreed to pay Panama shall be paid to Colombia instead, in other words, by the treaty of which he is so proud Panama ceases to exist for five years of her fixed sources of revenue and consents that it be paid to Colombia, and the United States contributes from its treasury \$250,000 and pays it to the treasury of Colombia."

"I know of no precedent for Mr. Cromwell's treaties. No people in the world, after successfully completing a revolution, have ever been asked to pay any portion of the debt, foreign or domestic, of the country from which it separated."

BURTON ELICITS APPLAUSE.

Mr. Burton (Ohio), elicited Republican applause when he rose to reply to Mr. Rainey. He said that Mr. Rainey

had abandoned for the most part his accusations made in prior speeches, and gone off and brings in a new lot of accusations, relating to the most part to a treaty now pending between Panama and the United States, and involving Colombia as well."

He declared that it would have been more edifying to the house, and more instructive to the country, if Mr. Rainey had proven the accusation he made.

"It is impossible," he exclaimed, "that there should be such childish, such careless abandonment of the rights of this country as to lead to the results which the gentlemen have portrayed."

As regards the Umber contract, he said it was an old scandal.

Mr. Burton then vigorously assailed Mr. Rainey. "I object," he said with vehemence, "to conjuring up wrongs and buttressing them with slander and falsehood, when there are real wrongs to right."

Mr. Rainey was immediately on his feet and demanded that the words be taken down, while Mr. Bartlett of Georgia wanted the Ohio member ordered to take his seat.

BURTON WITHDRAWS WORDS.

Mr. Burton, with a shrug of the shoulders, remarked that what he had said was going to lead to a scene, he would withdraw his words, "but," he added, "they were uttered under very great provocation."

Mr. Rainey at first declined to accept the withdrawal, but later did so.

Continuing, Mr. Burton declared that full justice should be given to the men engaged in the work of building the canal. "We should uphold their hands," he exclaimed, "and protect them against false accusations."

Men, he said, who attack those engaged in that work had found it necessary to go down into the malarial swamp and polluted pools of Panama itself.

Mr. Burton declared that Mr. Rainey should retract his remarks against President-elect Taft. Mr. Rainey's remarks, Mr. Burton said, had been on the level of political intrigue. There were far more weighty matters that the house could consider, Mr. Rainey, Mr. Burton declared, had taken up the cudgels of a disappointed side against their material without analyzing it.

Mr. Burton paid a tribute to Mr. Cromwell, President Obaldia and others mentioned by Mr. Rainey. He spoke of his acquaintance with Mr. Cromwell and said he never heard a word against Mr. Taft that reflected on his honesty as a man, or connected with him any schemes of exploitation.

"Are we not stepping below the level on which we stand," he inquired, "when we bring in private citizens here and openly accuse them of that which brings contempt and corruption?"

He challenged Mr. Rainey to make his statements out in the open. "Will he," he asked, "when he is outside the protection afforded by the Constitution and rules of the house, will he, out in the open, make the statements that he has been making here on the floor of this house? Will he make so free with reputations as he has in addressing us?"

The Democrats applauded when Mr. Burton said it was to the credit of the Democratic national committee that it had refused to have anything to do with the alleged scandal. "But what consolation is there," he asked, "for the accusation now made?"

THE ANANIAS CLUB.

Mr. Burton provoked laughter by saying that Mr. Rainey felt honored at having been put in the Ananias club. "The Ananias club," he said, "has never taken out articles of incorporation. It does not hold annual banquets. Its members wear no buttons. Its members don't buy any hosts to the club. A census of the membership would be excessively difficult, but I am afraid the number of eligibles would be extremely large."

Mr. Rainey, he added, was paragonously fitted for the presidency of the club.

"With a carelessness that ill-befits a member of this house," Mr. Burton said, "Mr. Rainey has listened to statements of detraction against men whose reputation should be above reproach."

INSISTS ON PROOF.

"Let us have a fair and square and direct statement and proof of that which he has already said," Mr. Burton pleaded. "Then, when they are all proved, perhaps the house and the country will listen to what else he has to say. But so long as the substantial averments he has made have been proved groundless, it is not for us to turn aside from our ordinary business to pay attention to further accusations."

"These that were made," he said, "had fallen to the ground from the weight of their own improbability, absurdity and incorrectness."

COCKRAN'S DEMAND.

While not sharing the opinion of Mr. Burton, "as to the necessity of Mr. Rainey's action in seeking protection under the house rules," Mr. Cockran (N. Y.) declared that it would be an intolerable situation for a citizen of the United States, who had not been convicted of a crime, to be assailed on the floor of the house and no method pro-

vided in which the truth could be ascertained. The right of character, he asserted, stood next to the right of life, "for the man whose character is gone lives like a dog." There should be, he contended, some way in which the person assailed could have the right to be heard on the floor of the house. He closed by demanding that Mr. Rainey's charges should be investigated, and their truth or inaccuracy once for all established.

CABIN JOHN BRIDGE.

President Issues Orders to Restore Jeff Davis' Name.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Official amended for the sensational elimination of Jefferson Davis' name from the tablets on Cabin John bridge, six miles west of this city, during the Lincoln administration, is given in directions the president issued today through the secretary of war to the chief of engineers of the army to restore the name. The tablets were begun under Davis as secretary of war, and when he joined the confederacy and became its president his name, under government orders, was obliterated from the tablets. The erasure of the name was by direction of Caleb Smith, Lincoln's secretary of the interior, after a suggestion by Galusha, Grow of Pennsylvania, then speaker of the house.

EX-CASHIER VILSACK PLEADED "NO DEFENSE"

Pittsburg, Feb. 22.—The third trial growing out of the recent graft exposures ended abruptly today when A. Vilsack, former cashier of the German National bank, pleaded "no defense" to a charge of bribery in connection with the \$17,500 said to have been given by W. W. Ramsey, former president of the bank, and Vice-president of the John F. Klein in payment for an ordinance making the bank a city depository.

Ramsey and Klein were convicted last week on similar charges.

Immediately the fourth trial was taken up. The defendants are Counselmen John F. Klein, J. C. Watson and William Brand, and W. W. Ramsey, the bank president. All are charged with conspiracy.

It was reported today that the next grand jury will return indictments against 38 members of the council.

WYOMING WOLVES ATTACK TWO HORSEMEN

Casper, Wyo., Feb. 22.—What is believed to be the first time in the history of Wyoming that wolves attacked a man, is an incident which occurred a few days ago in the Haystack mountains, south of this place. Blake Horton and Hans Evans, while riding the range, came upon the fresh trail of a band of wolves, and Evans, who held their horses, undertook to follow the trail on foot. He had proceeded half a mile, when the wolves, which had attacked him, shot at him and hastened back to find Horn fighting desperately with 19 gray wolves which had attacked him. Horn emptied his gun and wounded several of the ravenous animals before they were at close quarters with him. He was then bayed by using his gun as a club and shouting lustily. He was almost exhausted when Evans came within range and opened fire, the flank attack disconcerting the wolves and causing them to flee. An investigation followed, showing that while Evans was stalking the wolves they had been stalking Horn.

COOPER-SHARPE TRIAL GETS INTERESTING

Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 22.—When court adjourned tonight in the midst of the cross-examination of John D. Sharpe, the honors seemed divided between the state and the defense in the Cooper-Sharpe trial. The witness for the United States Senator Edward W. Carmack, Young Robin Cooper, under cross-examination for nearly two hours, appeared cool.

The next witness, and the only one of the day, was John D. Sharpe, and the cross-examination was direct examination. Sharpe swore that he saw the killing and that Carmack told after Robin Cooper had fired the shot.

One of the bullet wounds, a necessarily fatal one, pierced the senator's neck within a distance of an inch of the spinal cord, and came out under his tongue.

On cross-examination, Sharpe said that Carmack turned his head just as the second shot was fired. He did not explain how the bullet turned his head far enough to permit the ball to enter the median line of the neck on a straight line. The state called Sharpe back up to nearly 6 p. m. Sharpe told the stand with evident relief. His faithful wife, who has been missing a minute at his side at court, sprang up to meet him and cheered him with smiles and encouragement.

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INDIAN CITIZENSHIP.

Choctaws and Chickasaws Protest Against Reopening the Rolls.

Washington, Feb. 22.—On behalf of the Choctaw and Chickasaw Indians, Senator Owen of Oklahoma, has presented to the senate a petition from the general council of those tribes protesting against the reopening of their citizenship rolls. The petition is a review of all the efforts that have been made to establish correct citizenship rolls up to the time of the action by the Choctaw and Chickasaw citizenship court by which only about 150 out of more than 3,000 applicants were accepted. It is contended that the claims of those applicants which had been favorably passed upon by the district courts, were largely fraudulent and the petition declares that many of them were admitted on testimony presented before masters of the courts, who were attorneys for the plaintiffs. The Indians say they have expended more than a million dollars in protecting their rights against these applicants and they utterly without grounds entitling them to recognition. If, they say, the establishment of citizenship had been left as originally to the Indians courts, there would have been no injustice, but they represent that wrong step was taken when the Dawes commission was given authority to prepare rolls, and that, even worse than this, was the reference to the courts of the white man and their masters. It was these courts which admitted so many claimants which the Indians declare to be impostors, but their work was largely reversed by the citizenship court created in 1902. It appears that there is now an effort to re-open the proceedings and give the claimants another opportunity which the Indians seek to prevent.

In their petition they charge that many of the false claims to citizenship are inspired by attorneys who encourage applicants in the hope of obtaining large fees in the event of their success.

Many of these attorneys, they declare are lobbyists, and it is asserted that a favorite plan of some of them is to present to senators, members of Congress, and officials of the government persons of dark complexion, whom they represent to be Choctaw or Chickasaw Indians, when as a matter of fact, many of them are not Indians at all.

FATHER MURDERS HIS FOUR CHILDREN

Mondovi, Wis., Feb. 22.—Hans B. Hanson, a farmer living near here, murdered his four children, a boy and three girls, whose ages ranged from 5 to 15 years, early today. He is supposed to have used a butcherknife, cutting their throats. He followed the awful quadruple crime by attacking several horses and cows, firing the barn and house and then cutting his own throat. The bodies of the children were cremated. Hanson was 26 years of age, a bachelor, and was once an inmate of an asylum.

COUNTERFEITING PLANT FOUND IN GOLDFIELD

Goldfield, Nev., Feb. 22.—Following the discovery that thousands of time checks on the Consolidated Mines company, the complete counterfeiting plant in a house on Broadway, equipped with furnace, distilling apparatus, stamping, rolling, metal dies for the press, engravers' tools, sample checks, and a small library covering the art of fine engraving.

C. J. Love, who had purchased the house and the land occupied, had disappeared, leaving no trace of his whereabouts. Love was employed by the Consolidated Mines company.
