The Liberal mass meeting held last night in the city hall was a rather tame affair, but it was a successful rally nevertheless. After a short executive session, Chairman Lundy called the meeting to order and Secretary Emerson read the call.

William Patterson's resolution was read and J. D. Patterson followed in quick succession. Everything was moving along steadily enough when Hupp moved that the organization adjourn.
