**Assault and Battery.**—Two ladies from Sandy were before Justice Pyper this afternoon, one being charged with a mild form of assault and battery upon the person of the other.

**Arizona News.**—We have before us a letter from a lady in Arizona to her sister living in Weber County, which we are permitted to make some extracts. The lady's family, though they have been two months in the country, are still living in tents, but the beautiful mild weather makes such a habitable exceedingly pleasant. The time is principally occupied in sowing and putting in grain and in preparing engines for their cattle and chickens, (the wolves being very destructive to the latter). Eggs find a ready sale at 50 cents a dozen, and butter at 75 cents per pound. About one thousand dollars worth of choice fruit trees had just arrived and were being distributed among the settlers. There are a number of wagons on the way to the new settlement, which is called Mesa City, and it is expected that by the 1st of April the railroad will be within 15 miles of them. A market will thus be opened for their produce, and a prosperous enterprising town will soon spring into existence.

It gives us great pleasure to record the progress and extension of settlements organized and occupied by the Saints. Before the righteous inhabitants of these valleys is about to open a bright future, when their rights and privileges will be universally recognized. Every movement, therefore, to the enlargement and advancement of Zion's cause will be witnessed with joy and encouraged by every true Latter-day Saint. We are satisfied that the power of this people will be felt and sought after by those who with such consummate bigotry seek to trample upon their overtures and destruction. Success to the Arizona settlers!

**Breach of Promise.**—An interesting case came up before Justice Pyper, yesterday, for settlement, one which drew an eager crowd of spectators, mostly of the same nationality as the interested parties. A young Dane or Swede named Louis Lindman came acquainted with a buxom damsel named Mathilda Johnson. To make the story short, their mutual acquaintance finally culminated in a marriage engagement, to the apparent satisfaction of both parties. Then the young man expended considerable means in purchasing furniture, which he left in the room occupied by his inamorata until the happy day when they twain should be made one. The lady seemed in no hurry to fix the wedding day, and it finally appeared that her feelings towards the owner of the furniture had changed, at least such was the information he received. She denied the imputation, but Louis would not be soothed, and accordingly went to her room and took away his furniture. The suit yesterday was brought by the lady for the recovery of the property, her attorney being Mr. Jonasson. Messrs. Maxwell and Caldwell appeared for the defense, and the arguments, which were quite lengthy, partook partly of a pathetic, partly of a ridiculous nature. The statements of the witnesses, which had to be interpreted into English, and the whole proceedings generally caused much amusement to the spectators. Justice Pyper will not give a decision in the case until to-morrow.

**Police Doings.**—A man and woman were arrested for selling beer without a licence. Their examination will be proceeded with this afternoon.

A young woman bearing a respectable name was arrested for prostitution.

An old man, well known at the police station, was last evening picked up dead drunk. He was lying on his face in the snow, his clothing and boots were frozen, and without doubt would have been dead this morning but for the assistance of two of the officers. He is considered a common vagrant, and he was sentenced to seventy days' imprisonment. He is thus provided for until warm weather comes again.

**Pittsburgh Coke.**—This morning we were shown a specimen of coke, of very fine quality, which has been presented to the Deseret Museum, by Mrs. M. C. Smith, of 35 Anderson Street, Allegheny City, Pa. It was sent by that lady by mail to this city, and delivered in fine condition at the Museum. We learn from the curator that it will be assigned a place in one of the cabinets, where its beauties can be seen and where it will be preserved from atmospheric influence. It is worthy of preservation, as a specimen of the skill of the Pittsburgh manufacturers of an article which is largely imported at present into this Territory.
