FITZSIMMONS IS READY.

Has Posted \$5,000 for a Fight With (Either Ryan or O'Brien.

Bob Fizsimmons has posted \$5,000 to fight Tonimy Ryan or Jack O'Brien in San Francisco for the middleweight champion-

Francisco for the middleweight champion-ship. A battie between Fitzsimmons and eith-er Ryan or O'Brien would settle the vexed question as to who is entitled to the mid-dieweight championship. At present both Fitz and Ryan claim this ditle, and O'-Brien wants a chance to win it. Fitzsimmons has been preparing for a fight for some months, and asys he would be able to step into the ring in first class shape after a short slege of training. Jack O'Brien says he is perfectly willing to fight Fitzsimmons and will be pleased to have the match made as quickly as possible. He agrees to Fitzsimmons terms of 158 pounds ringside, but says that Fitz-simmons knows as well as he that there can be no side bet of \$5,009. O'Brien says he will post \$2,500 when the match is made, and will post the addi-tional \$2,500 as soon as the club and ref-eree are selected.
