A PAPER representing the "Josephites" and called the Saint's Herald, copies a sentence or two from the DESERET NEWS in regard to the assumptions of Congress. We stated that "The people of the Territories are not the 'property' of the United States," and the Herald answers:

"This is quite true, but the territary on which those people live is the property of the United States, and the people living on that terri-tory are tenants at will, and wards of the Government. There is no safer foundation for the exercise of governmental control and protec-tion over the District of Columbia, over which Congress has exclusive jurisdiction in all cases than for the exercise of like powers over Utah, or any other territory the common property of the States."

any validity he must know that Congress has no rightful powers but those conferred by the Constitution, also that powers not granted are re-served; if he does not, he may learn these simple points from the instru-ment itself. That no such powers as those exercised over Utah are constitutionally vested in Congress, is a matter beyond dispute, because there is nothing in the Constitution that confers them upon that body.
