PARTICIPANTS IN DEBATE.
Teams Selected to Take Sides on Question in Corporation Law.

It was finally decided Tuesday night in Judge Armstrong's court room in the city and county building just who would take part in the John R. Park debate on Dec. 1. The teams will consist of Hugo H. Anderson, L. T. Perry, and L. H. Hansen for the affirmative, and Frank Johnson, C. Wooding, and J. M. Inanger for the negative. Warren Stratton and Jonathan Gibbs were selected as alternates.

The question which is to be debated will be the bona fide contention in the big debate with Oregon, is "Resolved, That all corporations engaged in interstate business shall be required to incorporate under federal law, it being mutually conceded that such a system is constitutional and that a federal license shall not be used as an alternative solution."

FLOOD OF MONEY BEING SENT OUT

Rush on at Money Order Window to Send Holiday Gifts to the Fatherland.

The holiday rush is on at the money order windows at the postoffice. Long lines of money-laden foreigners through the corridors all the day long and many thousands of dollars are being transferred to the coffers of Uncle Sam daily, only to be called for in far-off Italy, Sicily, Greece, Hungary, Austria, and Germany, where the bulk of the emigrants is going.

They are the Christmas gifts for the folks in the fatherlands and are being sent this way to provide plenty of time for their transmission. Orwell Williams, at the head of the money order department, said this morning that from present indications the amount sent abroad this year would break all records for Salt Lake.

"These foreigners certainly have a very strong love for their kin," he said. "You would be surprised to know how many of them send a few dollars. The fact that we have had a very prosperous year in the intermountain country and that work has been plentiful accounts for the increased business at these windows."

"The foreign orders will continue to hold the front for about three weeks, and then we will be flooded by the home business. There are hundreds and hundreds of Americans who send their Christmas presents in the form of money orders with an injunction of 'buy what you want' and they are the ones who bring us a great business every year. I expect also to see a record breaker in this line this year."
