THE CIGARETTE QUESTION.

Friends of the bill to prohibit the sale of cigarettes to minors, which has knocked as yet unsuccessfully at the doors of the New York legislature, may find some solace in the internal-revenue report for January in the two great cigarette-making districts of the oily of New York. It shows a falling off of more than 25 per cent in the manufac ture of paper cigarettes as compared with the same months last year. It may mean that the consumption of cigarettes has decreased, or merely that there has been an over-supply, which has caused manufacture to be temporarily restricted. It is matter of common observation that within a year or two cigarettes with an admixture of Trukish or Egyptian tobacco have come to be smoked in this country much more than formerly, in preference to cigarettes made solely of American tobacco. That shifting of the popular taste may account for the falling off the report shows. Though many Turkish and Egyptian cigarettes are doubt-less made in New York, they are stronger than the American cigarettes, and with the best intentions the smoker

cannot consume so many of them. The foreign cigarettes, too, being somewhat deadlier and more insidious than our own, probably induce more frequent periods of remorse and abstinence in persons who use them.-Harper' Weekly.
