## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Vehicle Trade Lively.**—The local carriage and vehicle trade in this city reports a splendid business during the current year, and lively times at present.

**Attendance Increasing.**—There are 66 students in the Y. M. C. A. night schools, up to date, with promise of an early increase to a much larger figure.

**Winter in Los Angeles.**—O. S. Williams, local civil service examiner, will take his family to Los Angeles Saturday next, to leave there for the winter. He will be absent 10 days.

**Obituary.**—John Osborne aged 88, died at Midway Monday, and his funeral was held at noon today, from the O'Donnell parlors in this city. Interment was in the city cemetery.

**Michigan Alumni.**—There is a press to organize a Michigan University Alumni association in this city, as there are estimated to be over 50 graduates of that institution in the city.

**Goshen's Address.**—Rev. E. L. Goshen delivered an address yesterday afternoon on "Progress of the Race, or Human Culture," before the Women's club at the residence of Mrs. John L. Bowman, 334 east Fifth South street.

**Paving Work.**—The paving of State and south Main streets below Fourth South, where sections have been left incomplete, is now being finished up, so that the recurrence of the winter's muddy season will find those streets passable.

**From Rhode Island.**—Thomas P. Moore of Providence, R. I., is in Utah visiting this week. He is the guest of his son, Mr. and Mrs. John T. Morgan, of Bingham Junction, who are spending their vacation here. The Morgan home is at 207 south Main street.

**Gloves Darkened.**—The globs of the three arc lamps in the rear of the tabernacle auditorium have had their backs darkened with paint, so that occupants of the rear galleries will be no longer blinded by the glare. The relief is welcome.

**To Teach Hebrew.**—The Congregation Monteith Orthodox Jews is spending \$1,500 in fitting up the bavement of the synagogue for a school where Jewish children may be taught Hebrew between the hours of 3 and 5 p. m. Prof. Mueller has been engaged to teach the children.

**We're Off to Jamestown.**—Willard Weihs will go with J. J. McBell to Jamestown to take part in the mission work. He will leave with Utah day at the next exposition on Oct. 15. The governor members of the Utah delegation, and others, will leave Thursday for the Virginia show.

**Valuable Volume.**—State Auditor Edwards has been presented by Senator George Sutherland with an official register of all persons in the service of the government in all branches, from legislative to military. The register is in two large leather-bound volumes, containing over 3,500 pages.

**City Hay Moving.**—Hay from Mountain Dell is being moved under the supervision of Land and Water Commissioner Frank Matthews. Seven teams and horses have been brought down and detached to the various departments of the city surrounding the foulder. The hay is bailed and is said to be in excellent condition.

**Appointed Delegates.**—Gov. John C. Cutler has appointed the following delegates to the American Mining Congress to be held in Justin, Mo.: Harry Joseph, Lafayette Holbrook, John Dern, Jessie Knight, Lester Mangum, R. H. Bradford, W. F. James, C. P. Overfield, Samuel Newhouse and George Ritter.

**Freshmen at Yale.**—Local Yale men will be interested in learning that there are at present 720 freshmen in the scientific and academic departments at Yale, right from the preparatory schools. 238 account and 232 scientific. It is said that further additions to be made a little later on will run the total up to 800 freshmen.

**Photo of Gracie.**—S. B. P. Meakin has received a photograph of the grave and tomb of his wife, the late Gladys H. Riggs, at Independence, Mo. The deceased was for many years a resident of this city, but of late had resided in the east, where he died Sept. 11, 1917; an account of which appeared in the "News" a day or two later.

**State Health Conditions.**—Secretary of the state board of health says that hygienic conditions over the state are very much improved, as the result of educational agitation in the past few years by his board. The secretary says that people are learning the value of providing themselves with pure water, and maintaining premises free from infestation.

**Returns to Paris.**—Mrs. Montgomery, Dr. Marion's widow, 74th Avenue of this city, was recently in New York on a short trip to this country from Paris, but has returned to the French capital, where she resides with her daughter Mildred. The latter has become an accomplished violinist. Capt. Parker of the Eighth Infantry, Mrs. Parker's husband, is in Paris, and the applicant, heard of his whereabouts.

**My Company in Strata.**—The H. V. Meloy Merchandise company of Elko, is in financial difficulties, and has made an assignment to J. J. McCarl, who will turn the settlement of the company's affairs over to the Utah Association of Credit men. The amount of the assets placed at \$70,000, but nothing certain is known yet of its liabilities. Mr. Meloy is well known in this city, where he was formerly a resident.

**Manager Murray at Butte.**—Manager D. H. Murray of the Bell Telephone company will remain for some time at Butte to superintend the

restoration of the service there, where it has been practically suspended for the last month through the aggressive interference by the labor unions. Judge Hunt's injunction has knocked the prop from under the union's position, and left the telephone company free to go about its business.

**May Inspect Newhouse Building.**—So many applications have been received for permission to the grounds where the Newhouse buildings are going up, that Mr. Newhouse has consented to open up the gates of the high fence surrounding the building and admit people to inspect the operations. The goods will be all day next Sunday, a great deal of steel and material have lately been hauled to the ground, and the inspection of the grounds will be interesting. An attendant will be present to conduct visitors and answer questions.

**Bailey is Back.**—W. E. Bailey, manager of the Nelson-Judson Drug company, has returned from Denver, where he attended the annual meeting of the National Association of Wholesale druggists. Mr. Bailey returns considerably more interested with Salt Lake than with Denver. The weather has been very quiet. He says there was no action taken by the convention of any particular local interest; the business transacted bearing rather on the trade at large than on the interests of any section of the country.

**Oil Company Articles.**—The Utah Headlight Oil company filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk today. The company is organized by 15 or more incorporators, many of them of Elkhorn county. The principal place of business is in Salt Lake City, and the company is to be used to develop oil fields and dispose of in every way of their products. The officers are: Oran A. Lewis, president; A. B. Rockhill, vice president; John T. Morgan, secretary and treasurer. The capital stock is \$1,000,000 in shares of \$1 each. The entire capital of the company is subscribed.
