CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.

The Census Bill.—Alteration of Duties. Preparations to meet Peabody's Remains.

The House went into Committee of the whole on the Census bill. The section fixing the number of representatives was stricken out on the motion of Garfield, who thought this matter had better be fixed in another bill. To the section requiring statistics from railroad and canal, and lake and inland navigation companies, etc. Garfield proposed to add all express, telegraph, life, fire and marine and insurance companies. Ingersoll offered an amendment which was adopted, requiring statistics from bankers and brokers. Cox expressed the opinion that the bill was overloaded with inquisitorial requirements, which would delay the completion of the census for ten years, and said the gentlemen on the other side were responsible for building upon these railroad monopolies, and now wanted information to grapple with the children they had created. Cobb, of Wisconsin, offered an amendment requiring information of the amount of United States bonds held by corporations and individuals. He wished for the information in hopes that the Ways and Means Committee might then devise a plan of taxing the interest thereon. Garfield thought the information could not be got. Pending the discussion a Senate message announced their proceedings with reference to the death of Senator Fessenden. Eulogies were pronounced by Lynch, Peters, Hale, Brooks and Dawes. The House then adjourned.

The Ways and Means Committee are still at work on the tariff bill. They fixed the duty on coffee at twenty instead of twenty-five cents per pound; on tea four instead of five cents and reduced the duty on pig iron from nine to seven dollars per ton, on scrap iron from eight to six dollars, and increased the duty on manufactured iron. A resolution has been introduced authorizing the President to make such military and naval preparations for the reception of the fleet with Peabody's remains as are commensurate with the dignity of the country and the merits of the deceased. It was laid over until Monday.

WEST INDIES.

Resignation of the Brazilian Ministry.

Dates from Rio say that the Brazilian ministry having unsuccessfully opposed the continuation of the war against Paraguay, have tendered their resignations, which have been accepted.

MISSOURI.

Coroner's charge of murder.

St. Louis.—The Coroner has preferred a charge of murder in the fourth degree against the Architect, Assistant Superintendent, and Contractors of the stone masonry building which recently fell at the corner of Fifth and Olive streets.

CALIFORNIA.

University to be Free.

SAN FRANCISCO.—The Regents of the University of California have resolved to abolish all the fees after April 6th, 1870, and declare the institution as the free property of unqualified applicants from all countries. They have also requested the legislature to pass a law permitting the board to organize a preparatory department of the University.

NEW YORK.

Fine Counterfeit Plate.—New Stock Exchange.

NEW YORK.—Col. Whiting, chief of the U. S. secret service, received by express from Philadelphia last evening, a package containing a counterfeit ten dollar national bank note plate. The plate, which is in four pieces, two for the face and two for the back, is splendidly engraved on the finest steel, the latter bearing the imprint of John Sellers & Sons, Sheffield. Experts pronounce it the best plate ever seen. They were of opinion that no notes had ever been printed upon it. The person sending it says he has been a counterfeiter for the past twelve years, but has reformed and left for foreign parts.

A New York special says the stock exchange has determined to seek other quarters. Negotiations are pending for the purchase of A. T. Stewart's building, corner of Chambers street and Broadway. The purchase seems tolerably certain.

WASHINGTON.

Constitutionality of the Legal Tender Act.

Washington special says the Supreme Court decision on the bank tax question indicates that the court will sustain the constitutionality of the legal tender act. The Chief Justice, speaking for the entire bench, except Nelson and Davis, declared that Congress has the constitutional right to authorize the emission of bills of credit. In another place he says the exercise is indubitably constitutional and it is within the power of Congress to make a currency for the whole country. These expressions lead Congressmen to believe the legal tender act is safe.

FOREIGN NEWS.

WEST INDIES.

Steamer "Estrella" Sprung a Leak.

KINGSTON, JAMAICA, Nov. 29, via Havana, Dec. 14.—The steamer Estrella having sailed from Cape Hayti to Port au Prince sprung a leak. On the night of Nov. 27th, a large crack was discovered below the water line, upon the discovery of which a panic occurred among the passengers and crew. Two passengers, including Mr. Greg, the American consul at Kingston, escaped in a small boat and reached San Nicolas. A perfect panic prevailed, but by the efforts of the officers of the Estrella she was kept afloat and reached Molita Nicoya early on Sunday, where she was met by a schooner which took her passengers off and brought them to this city, where they arrived this morning.

ROME.

The Ecclesiastical Council.

NEW YORK.—The Herald's London special states that an important Papal Bull has been issued under the seal of strict secrecy, establishing regulations for the Ecumenical Council, in his exordium. His Holiness exhorts the Bishops to live in the practice of charity, humility, sobriety and in pious contemplation during the session of the council. He declares that although the right of making propositions for the council belongs to him and himself and the Court of Rome, (ad nos et ad sanctum Sedem), he desires and exhorts every father to think his duty to make propositions; but these conditions: First: the proposition to be made in writing and submitted privately to the Council of Bishops named by the Pope; second: the propositions must have for their object the general interest of the church and not any particular diocese; third: that it be accompanied by a statement of the motives which led to its presentation; fourth: that it be conformable to the spirit and traditions of the Catholic Church. His Holiness imposes secrecy on every person concerned in these conciliatory labors with an order of procedure fixed as follows: The Cardinal Bishops, Primates, Archbishops, Bishops, Abbots, generals of the monastic order and fathers are authorized to designate ten of their number to be charged with the judicial settlement of contests arising among themselves. The bull appoints officers of the Council naming as legation, or prolegation, the general congregation, Cardinals de Resaca, Delucchi, Buzzerre, Billio and Capaldi. The fathers who desire to harangue the assembly must obtain an authorization from a Legate on the evening preceding the day on which they intend to speak. Those who intend to propose canons must first submit them to one of four commissions on faith, discipline, religious orders and oriental affairs. These commissions are to be chosen by the fathers, but each to be presided over by a Cardinal named by the Pope. The bull prohibits the fathers from absenting themselves before the conclusion of the Council, and authorizes them to reside outside their dioceses during the Council. A majority of bishops are disaffected with many of the provisions of the papal bull.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The Reciprocity Treaty.

LONDON.—The Telegraph, in an editorial on the renewal of the reciprocity treaty, predicts some modifications in the policy of Congress towards the Dominion of Canada, through the influence of Secretary Fish, who is a free trader.

FRANCE.

Carlists on the French Borders.

PARIS.—The Carlist insurrectionists continue active on the French border. Several cases of arms, suspected to belong to them, were seized yesterday by the French authorities at Bayonne.
