

AGAINST AMERICANS

High-handed Action of French Officials
Against United States Citizens.

TREATY RIGHTS DISREGARDED.

American Busted Refugees, Liberty by
the French, Is the Safety Evaded—
Persons Among the Numbers.

Elder J. W. Draper, of MILBURN,
and W. A. Beaman, of
SALT LAKE CITY, have arrived home
from a mission to the Hawaiian Islands.
They bring the testimony that the
Latitude Saints and their American
friends are breaking the law in
engaging in political strife. They
are threatening the safety of
Frenchmen who are engaged in
arbitrations and trials before
courts of law. The French government
is giving a fair statement
of facts based upon reliable
information given to our
missionaries.

Please be letting to be very
cautious on the Hawaiian Islands. The
people who are suffering are the
French. For over forty years there
had a large following among the
Frenchmen here. Now the French
officials are trying to injure the
missionaries and are persecuting
them through means of law, the
prosecution and punishment.

Our missionaries arrived
yesterday from the summer home.
They were J. W. Draper, W. A.
Beaman, his assistant, and Acting
Elder T. Jones. The month of
A. Gilbert, a member of the
Latitudianary Church of Jesus
Christ of Latter-day Saints. Both
sects of the Mormon church are
presented with equal severity.

"Our trustees have now
said Mr. Draper and his
wife that the action of these French
officials, yet I mention to you
the story, that it might increase
the severity with which my brethren
are being treated."

He had a hurried consultation with
Mr. Draper and Mrs. Jones. He
then decided to tell all of some of the
circumstances, but said because of the
importance and so to express that he
had told all of them.

We have been among the natives
for a long time without restraint. In
fact, Governor Tabata, the executive
officer of the Teinean group, appointed
me, as he said the native was
more intelligent, than any other, and
was more reliable, and less given to
doubtfulness than the others.

But about a year ago we May the
French government changed the
governor and put another in
the place of Governor Martin of Tahiti.

Up to that time the Mormons had
grown in strength during many years.
Then a change came. The two groups
were not openly at variance, but
the circumstances of the
Mormons by their disbursements
of the interlocutors.

When the summer came arrived
last November their appearance
was new. This was the result of a
meeting by the "Reorganized"
branch of the Church, who are known
in Tahiti as the Latter-day Saints.

They intended to it to carry mis-
sionaries from island to island.

Their leader, Martin, arrived the
week before the French flag, which
practically prohibited it flying among the
islands.

Tabata and Governor Martin, while
advised by Governor Draper, desired
to have the Latitudianary Church
religion and its members.

He says that when his people went
to Governor Martin with a petition asking
the liberty to worship, the governor
told him he could not recognize
any faith not recognized by France.

This is the only excuse he would
give for his cruel action. He has
nothing against our people except that
they were Mormons, and those are
not yet Protestant, Calvary and
Methodist.

Now we are to be treated
hurriedly and surely. When I have
questioned him how he would, and
it has been impossible for my people to
obtain justice.

We are now always compelled to take
the way of the Latitudianary Church
for protection. They had no
school in connection with their mis-
sions. The school was in a very
disastrous condition. So it was
that the president placed us in
the hands of the Latitudianary Church.

The reason given was the same that
we had received.

The coming of the schools was
not possible for us to do, so we
went to Governor Tabata, asking
that they could not make the law
their masters. With their mas-
ters as the teachers. The answer
was, "If we know it," are we
not to be allowed to do it?

The I asked that we be allowed to
make our own school, a petition
was sent to the president of France
and the answer from him was
no. We were told that if we
should our school we will be
expelled.
