New York, Sept. 20.-With only enough coal left to finish out the month. the Brooklyn schools are threaten with an enforced recess. Only 1.000 tons of coal remain on hand for sup-plying 145 buildings. By the most rigid cenomy this amount can be made to last one week. As it has been found impossible to get

a supply of coal in this country for the winter months for the 16 public schools of Yonkers, the board of education has decided to import coal from Wales rather than close the schools. Bids were asked for about 2,600 tons of anthracite, the dealers being allowed all the latitude possible in price. Not a bid was received.

Christileb, a merchant of the same city, and John Manuel Munoz, inspector of the general customs of Mexico, with Mr. Christlieb as secretary. The commission expects to be absent ten months.
