Harriman People Object to Rapid Transit on Wall Avenue and Franchise Deferred.

FRED HALL IS BADLY INJURED

Thrown from Horse Frightened by Dogs-G. A. R. Entertainment-Y. M. C. A. Building Project.

Ogden, March 23 .- Contrary to expectations the ordinance granting the Ogdan Rapid Transit company a franchise for an extension on Wall avenue from Twenty-fifth to Thirty-second street, did not come up before the city council at its mession last evening but was deferred for one week. This action was taken after the council had been addressed in executive session. by Parley L. Williams, general attorney for the Oregon Short Line and the Harriman interests. Mr. Williama contention was the same as was W. H. hevers, local freight agent of the Harriman system, which was to the effect that they had no objection to the granting of the franchise if it was solely for urban traffic. He trged that if the franchise was granted to the Rapid Transit company with no clause sgainst interurban traffic that it would be unfair to the Harriman interests as its tracks and depot are close to the proposed line of the Rapid Transit ompany.

At the conclusion of Mr. Williams' emarks it was decided to postpone otion on the franchise antil next Monday night. Other reutine matters were considered before adjournment.
