LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

OLD FARTWAD.—Under the above heading, the Gold Hill News of the 12th inst. has the following in reference to the death of an old resident of this City:

PROCESSING NICELY.—We are pleased to be able to state that Bishop William B. Hodger, of Logan, who recently met with a very severe accident at Soda Springs by being shot through the arm, is doing much better than might naturally be expected, considering the severe nature of the wound. The charge with which the gun was loaded was unusually large one. A considerable quantity of the lead lodged in the arm, which was extracted by Dr. Anderson, and some of it passed through and came out the other end of the left shoulder. The shoulder joint was uninjured, for had it been otherwise the consequences might have proved fatal. The lead which was extracted from the wound, about the size of a bone, some of them full an inch long and about half an inch below the shoulder joint downwards for some distance, being literally blown to pieces. One of the muscled was also shot through. The bullet passing into the elbow can be moved. There is every indication to present that although the arm may always be somewhat stiff it will by no means be rendered useless.

Living to the fortitude and patience shown by the Bishop from the time of the accident, quite a number of persons thought the injuries he sustained were not near so severe as they were, some of whom were very convinced of their mistake after a professional examination of the wound by Dr. Anderson.

As we have already said, the Bishop is getting along nicely, there being no indications of inflammation in the injured limb, and should be continuing to progress as favorably as he is getting along. We may expect to see him round again before long, a result which will be hailed with great pleasure by his many friends.

Called, to-day, Mr. Edward A. Littlefield, late editor of the Nevada State Journal, who visits this City with the intention of making it his home; also Mr. William Burk, agent for Mr. James W. Mr. Burk, lectured in the Tabernacle, Ogden, even evening. As he is well acquainted with many of the "Bears," he expects to see them again before long. He has a great deal to say about the gold mines and the machinery used in the mining process.
