PRIVATE SMITH SHOT.

Member of Twelfth Battery Severely Wounded-Attempted to Escape.

Private Oscar Smith of the Twelfth Light battery was shot yesterday and langerously wounded at Fort Douglas, while trying to escape from the guard. Smith had been detained at the post after his command left for Fort Russell, to be tried for stealing, and yes-terday was at work under guard at the quartermaster's department. While e attention of the sentry, Private H. Bartlett of F company, Twentyninth infantry, was momentarily at-tracted elsewhere, Smith darted out of the door for Red Butte canyon.

The sentry called three times to halt, but Smith only ran the faster. Then the sentry fired three shots on either side of the sprinter and over his head, and Smith ran faster yet. Then the sentry took careful aim and sent a bullet, straight through Smith's body. The in-jured man ran 25 feet, turned a somersault, and fell. He was picked up and sent to the hospital, where the sur-geons thought at first that his wound But today there was an improvement.

Architect F. A. Hale visited Stanford university while on the coast, and in his pinion the total damage to the institu ion is not over three millions. Neither Triumphal arch nor the gorgeous

the Triumphal arch nor the gorgeous chapel will be restored as they were. The marble statue of Prof. Agassiz of Harvard, which took a sky rocket flight through the air and took a header through the eement pavement, had been dug out and found to have suffered no material damage.

At San Jose, the effects of the earthquake were the most plainly seen, as the earth was full of fissures and every building was out of plamb. But at San Francisco the seene of desolation was ideal, and beyond the powers of description, and hus not been exaggerated in the least. # YOUNG WOMAN'S FINE ROMANCING.

"Cowboy Nell" Turned Out to Be the Pal of Robbers.

SHE WAS ARRESTED HERE.

Had Dynamite in Her Possession-Said It Was for Mining, But Used It on Safes.

It will be remembered by readers of the "News" that one day last week Nello Monticell, sometimes known as "Cowboy Nell," a young girl, hailing from Montrose, Colo., was arrested in this city, for endeavoring to ship 10 pounds of dynamite to De Lamar, Nev., in her baggage. The girl said that she was going to Nevada to prospect. She was not afraid, either of the hard-ships or the dangers of the desert. Dressed in male attre, armed with a brace of pistols and equipped with mitting requisites and camp parapher-nalia, she would go out alone to seek for the yellow metal that would make her wealthy, and at the same time she would realize the romance and advenwould realize the romance and adven-ture that she longed to experience. such was the young woman's story, as told while in custody here. The dynamite was intended, she said, for blasting purposes in the hills. It turns it was really meant to used in blowing open safes and to help in schemes of robbery in general.

After being released from jall here, the girl expressed the dynamite to De Lamar and proceeded to that town her-There she told the same story, self. There she told the same story, and gained the ears of many persons, including a number of women. Much interest was shown in the young girl of 16, who alone and unprotected would go into the wilds to seek her fortune.
Prior to the arrival of "Cowboy Nell"
in De Lamar, there had come to the
same town a Pinkerion detective named Hicks. He was in quest of a Montana murderer named Hansen, whom he had just located and was proceeding to gain the man's confidence, when he also esthe man's confidence, when he also espied another man whom he sought for a similar crime, in the person of one Hughey Monroe. The confidence of Monroe was also gained by the detective. The latter learned of "Cowboy Nell" and of her intended visit to De Lamar, where she was to meet Monroe, A hold schame of robbery was haiched A bold scheme of robbery was hatched by Monroe and Hicks, in which "Nell" was also to take part. Upon her ar-rival the plot was soon carried out. Three places were to be robbed in one night, namely, Nesbett Bros., Pete Sal-mensen's and Barvichi's. Nesbett's was tackled first by the trio, who had been Joined by Frank Sanford, one of the company's employes.

the company's employes.

Hicks had men stationed inside the building and at convenient places on the outside. At 2 o'clock a. m., he and his three pals crept up to the place intended to be robbed. Upon the shoulders of Hicks, Monroe, unfastered tened an upper window. A shot rang out, fired from the inside, and Monroe fell back, with a bullet in his left hand.
The two officers on the outside then
put in an appearance. They were espied by "Cowboy Nell," who attempted
to draw her pistol. Before she could to draw her pistol. Before she could do so, however. Detective Hicks, who had thrown off hig guise of robber, seized and held her fast. She cursed him for his perfidy. Monroe, the girl and the accomplice Sanford were all taken into custody. The prisoners were taken to Callende, where they will have a speedy trial. Sanford will doubtless ask for and obtain mercy for complicity in the affair. Monroe is anted in Montana for killing a man in Madison county in 1891.
