

FAST HORSES AT CALDER'S RACES.

Red Cross Nurse Surprises Bookies
By Brilliant Finish in
Last Event.

FINE PROGRAM FOR TODAY.

Only Small Crowd Turned Out, but
Excellent Races May Bring More
For Rest of Meet.

This afternoon at Calder's Park the second day of a great four day race meet is being held. The entries include some fast horses, and judging by the race put up yesterday, a splendid showing should be made.

The most yesterday brought out fighting place that was of the first order, and while it was witnessed by only a few people, it is thought that if there is any combination of events that will bring a crowd to a race meet in Salt Lake, the present is the one and that either the people absolutely do not want horse racing or will sit in benches for the rest of the meet.

The three-quarter mile dash, which was the last race of the day was the best, and the favorite Los Angeles went down badly getting only third place, with Red Cross Nurse and Cash Day leading him in the losing was due to a bad start.

In this race the neck-and-neck run for half around the track between Cash Day and Red Cross Nurse, brought out the applause of the day.

Argot, the crack horse of the Ryan stable, got away bad and then put up a splendid run crowding the winners on the stretch till they won only by a nose in the third event.

BROKE STATE RECORD.
Hardy Downing Clipped Time Off Record For Motor-Paced Mile.

Hardy Downing secured first place in the hearts of the audience last Friday night by crowding Samuelson to the limit for first place in the half mile professional, and breaking the state record for the mile. His clipping on this record, which has stood all attempts for over a year, was four-fifths of a second.

The two mile lap handicap brought out some of the fastest runners of the city to the credit of J. P. Quinn who in the early part of the race, pumped up a speed that scared the back bunch and was backed up to the limit. He led him ahead of Samuelson, who finally took first place.

The three-quarter mile amateur developed the usual supply of spectators who rode the scratch men off their feet and caught the public eye as coming favorites. McKenzie led last night in favor, and unless, like so many of his kind, training takes the natural spirit out of him, he will soon be good for a place in the record makers.

PORTLAND MEET.
Multnomah Athletic Club Took First Place Among Juniors.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 4.—The Multnomah Athletic Club team won the junior M. A. C. meet at the fair grounds today, when they scored 49 points to 26 for their nearest competitor, the Olympic club of San Francisco. Three junior records were broken and one equaled.

Persons of the Olympic club broke the record for 100 yards by clearing 20 feet 11 inches of a second of the junior mark. A. C. Gilbert of the Multnomah club vaulted 12 feet 11 inches, clearing 20 feet 11 inches. Kelly of Multnomah broke the junior bar jump record of 10 feet 11 inches, when he cleared 21 feet 9 inches.

Gorman of Chicago equaled the 220-yard record of 1:25. A Ross of Chicago won the 40-yard run in 15.15. D. O. Sullivan of Anacosta won the throwing of the 16-pound weight by casting it 21 feet 4 inches.

Each side completed its first inning, the local men scoring 56, one more than the British players.

BEAT HIM.
Jimmy Gardner Bested Rufe Turner at Colma in Hard Fight.

Colma, Cal., Aug. 4.—The largest crowd by far in the history of the Golden State Athletic association crowded the pavilion here this evening to witness the scheduled twenty-five-round contest between Jimmy Gardner and Rufe Turner. Gardner won the fight in the first three seconds of the eleventh round with a terrific right to the body. Turner showed to the better advantage in the first two rounds only. After that the fight was all Gardner's. In the fourth round he made Turner look like a novice. Turner took a brace in the seventh round and practically evened matters, but it was only temporarily. All during the night Gardner displayed remarkable cleverness in ducking and blocking. Turner was unable to reach him with any effective blows. At the conclusion of the tenth round Turner went to the floor after receiving several hard rights to the body and was saved for the time being only by the bell. When the bell tapped for the eleventh round Turner was on his feet and Gardner rushed over to Turner's corner and ended matters with a terrific right clean to the temple. There was considerable roughing all through the ten rounds.
