Dr. Condon did not proceed to care for the man and the mayor asked what he intended doing with the patient. The doctor replied that he was waiting for orders. The mayor answered that he did not need to wait for orders, that he knew how to care for smallpox and he would leave the matter to him, to care for as he thought best. Mayor Glasmann did not dispute the doctor's word on this case but agreed with him that the man had Dr. Condon ook care of the patient
