**Bills Introduced.**

WASHINGTON, 13.—Stevenson  
submitted a resolution requesting the  
Secretary of the Interior to in-  
form the Senate whether the duty  
imposed on Indian agents by the  
tenth section of the act making ap-  
propriations for the current and  
contingent expenses of the Indian  
department, for the year ending  
June 30, 1876, and for other pur-  
poses, approved third of March,  
1875, requiring each Indian agent  
to keep a record of the property of  
every kind, with a record of  
all contracts, together with re-  
ceipts of money from all sources,  
has been complied with by said  
agents; agreed to.

**Ingalls** introduced a bill to  
amend sections 6 and 13 of the re-  
vised statutes of the U. S. relat-  
ing to national banks to organize  
with a capital of \$50,000 in towns,  
respective of population, and to pro-  
vide that no national banking as-  
sociation shall be organized under  
the sections with a less capital  
than \$50,000; referred.

**Ingalls** introduced a bill to for-  
feit certain public lands granted to  
aid in the construction of a rail-  
road and telegraph line through the  
States of Missouri and Arkansas to  
the Pacific coast.

**Merriman** introduced a bill to ex-  
tend the time for filing claims for  
additional bounty, under the act of  
July 28th, 1868.

**Merriman** introduced a bill to re-  
peal so much of section 3 and 4 of  
the revised statutes as forbids the  
payment of the accounts, claims  
and demands therein named, and  
all laws and clauses of the Consti-  
tution of the United States for-  
bidding the payment thereof. The  
bill refers to claims or demands  
against the U. S. which were ac-  
cepted or existed prior to the 10th  
of April, in favor of any person  
who promoted, encouraged, or in  
any manner sustained the late re-  
bellion, it authorizes the pay-  
ment of such claims, and appropri-  
ates four hundred thousand dollars  
for that purpose.

**Senator Edmunds** introduced a  
bill authorizing the Hon. G. P.  
Marsh, U. S. Minister to Italy, to  
accept a pocket chronometer from  
the republic of Switzerland, and a  
mosaic table from the kingdom of  
Italy, tendered him by those gov-  
ernments in recognition of his ser-  
vices as arbitrator in settling the  
disagreement between them touch-  
ing the question of boundary.

**WASHINGTON, 13.**—Senator Sar-  
gent's bill relative to Pacific rail-  
road grants provides that all lands  
granted by the act of March 3, 1869,  
to the Atlantic and Pacific Rail-  
road Co. shall be declared forfeited,  
and shall revert absolutely to the public  
domain. His bill to protect persons  
of foreign birth against the con-  
straint or involuntary servitude  
is designed to remedy the defects  
in the law enacted in 1862.

**Representative Luttrell**, to-day,  
had an interview with the Secre-  
tary of the Interior, and secured the  
lands belonging to the assignees of  
the Oregon Military Wagon Road  
Company, now occupied as a  
reservation for the Kiama Indians.  
It is said to be impracticable  
to remove the Indians without war,  
and therefore a claim is made  
that the lands should be reserved  
for the Indians.

**A private letter from Leghorn**  
states that the marble statue of  
General Baker, who was killed at  
Ball's Bluff, was shipped on the  
19th of November for the United  
States; this was the last work of  
the sculptor, who recently died in  
Italy. Congress appropriated \$10,000  
for the statue, which is to be  
placed in the U. S. hall of representa-  
tives.

**The bill introduced by Senator**  
Wright, declaring the true intent  
and meaning of the Union Pacific  
R. R. Act of July 1st, 1862, July 2nd,  
and July 3rd, 1862, is a copy of the  
bill reported from the Senate, Ju-  
ly 1st, 1862, and is intended to  
provide that none of these acts  
shall be so construed by any officer  
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
