CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, June 27th, 1832, Mayor Jennings presiding: A petition was submitted from W. J. Lewis and forty-five others, complaining of the condition of South Temple street from the gas works to Eighth West street, and asking that repairs be made on each side of the Utah and Nevada Railway track. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

A petition from George Partington was presented, asking to be granted a small piece of land near a certain ravine on the Nineteenth Ward tench, whereon to build a cottage. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

A Philadelphia boy was asked if n public grounds.

lett. Charles Feveryear and Wm. W. Day, representing a committee appointed by the Salt Lake Cricket Club, asking the use of the west half of Washington Square on the Fourth of July next, between the hours of 9a. m. and 4 p. m., for the purpose of playing a cricket match with the Ogden Cricket Club, who had intimated an intention to visit had intimated an intention to visit slave. the city for that purpose. Refe red to the marshal, with authority to grant the prayer thereof if found not to interfere with the preparations for fireworks to be exhibited on said grounds in the evening of that day; provided, that no admis-sion fee be charged to citizens to enter said grounds and witness the

Petitions were submitted from foeeph Hyrum Parry, Oluf L. Hammer and John Feese, to sell notions, summer drinks, etc., at Liberty Park on July 4th, 1882. Referred to the marshal, with instructions to prohibit all venders and dealers of every description from erecting stands or carrying on their business inside the Park grounds, but the marshal was empowered to furnish ground on the north side of the street opposite the Park to all such vendors, at a charge of \$10 for each thirty feet.
John S Johnson and four others

petitioned for an extension of water mains on Second South street, be-tween Sixth and Seventh East streets, a distance of 422 feet, and offering to advance the sum of \$315 towards the improvement. Referred to the committee on water-Application from Youngberg &

Pederson for liquor license at No. 15t Commercial street, for three months was granted.

Councilor Watson petitioned in behalf of Mrs. Yacobson for a bridge across the canal on Sixth South, between Fourth and Fifth West

streets. Referred to the committee

on streets and alleys.

The report of the City Auditor for the quarter ending May 31st, was submitted, showing. Receipts during quarter ...... \$ 1,175 22

The city attorney submitted a re port of the condition of the city's business in his hands for the quarter ending May 31st, 1882, which was received and placed on file.

The quarterly report of the watermaster, showing an expenditure of \$706.80 for the threee months endirg

May 31st, was received and the expenditure approved.

The May report of the committee on construction of the the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal, showing

a total expenditure for the month of \$11,211.65, was referred to the committe on finance. The committee on finance,

whom was re'erred the quarterly report of the supervisor of streets, reported that they had examined the account of expenditures, compared it with the vouchers, and found that they agreed. They therefore recommended that the supervisor's report he account as a correct. visor's report be accepted as correct, and \$258.58 appropriated to cover the amout of expenditure not appro-palated at the end of the quarter. Adopted.

Bills for carriage and horse hire on June 17, at the opening of Liberty Park, were presented and allowed as follows: Mulloy & Paul, \$144; Mark

McKimmins, \$25.

An appropriation of \$10,183.35 was made to pay principal and interest of a corporation note dated April 24th, and given to the Descret National Bank for 60 days, at 8 per cent, par appropriation cent. per annum. An appropriation was made to

the arte ian well in the sum of \$2,500, and to Liberty Park in the sum of \$1,500, both to be drawn upon the orders of the Mayor.

Councilor D. H. Wells called the attention of the Council to the re-

ported cases of small-pox in Echo and vicinity, and suggest d that steps be taken to prevent the introduction of the disease into this city. To this end he nominated Dr. Jeter Clinton for the office of quarantine physician and stated that he knew him to be a man well adapted to the

position as past experience had abundantly proven.

Dr. Jeter Clinton was thereupon appointed to the office of quarantine physician of Salt Lake City and was instructed to act in conjunction with the committee on sanitary regula-tions in taking such precautionary measures for the prevention of small-pox in the city as might be deemed proper. On motion the subject of con-

sidering the propriety of dis-posing of the north half of Third North Street at its eastern terminus in plat E and bringing the other half to a proper grade was re-ferred to the committee on streets and alleys. Councilor Romney stated that

during the opening ceremonies at Liberty Park recently held, teams were tied to young trees inside the Park and considerable damage done to them thereby, and suggested, for the preservation of improvements made, that during the approaching holidays, no teams be permitted inside the Park grounds.

On motion the subject of prescribing temporary regulations for the governing of Liberty Park was referred to the Mayor and Marshal and they were empowered to enforce the same until such time as the committee having the subject of permanent rules and regulations under consideration are prepared to report.

The Mayor reported that in seeking to carry out the instructions of the Council, given at the last meeting, to appoint a committee of 13 to arrange for a general citizens celebration of the Fourth of July, he bad found a citizens committee already organized for that purpose, and himself and a number of gentlemen whom he named, to assist in the matter, had effected such a union with said citizens committee as he thought, under the circumstances, would be satisfactory.

A discussion of the report ensued in which it was developed that the arrangements effected by the Mayor were not strictly in accordance with the expectations nor wishes of the Council, but on metion it was decided to approve the action of the Mayor in relinquishing a celebration of the Fourth of July under the auspices of the city government, thereby relieving the corporation of On motion the subject of prescrib-

director of the city government, hereby relieving the corporation of it responsibility.

On motion of Councilor Clark, the privilege of using Liberty Park was extended to any organization giving a general coletration on the Fourth of July.
Adjourned for one week.


