

THE FODDER CROP.

Advertisement of Crops and Harvests and a Shredder.—Carrie Shredder Fodder. "I have not seen fodder, but find it in every place where there is a shredder. It is a great crop, but have now decided on what I consider the best fiber and the easiest, therefore the most acceptable, to employ and employed, follows: First, the use of a corn husker, which is the best, and a shredder attached to a motor to turn it.
