SAVING OF ARSENIC.

Has Become an Important Bi-Product

Of Anaconda Smelters. At the Washoe smelters at Anaconda, At the Washoe smelters at Anaconda, Montans, the arsenic refinery, which was recently added to the equipment, is in operation and now chemically pure arsenic is being made ready for the markets of the world. This plan has been suggested for the smelters of the Sait Lake valley and well known chemists, among them Marcus E. Jones of this city, have pointed out where the saving of the arzenic from the fumes would make a valuable bi-product.

A correspondent of the Butte Inter-countain says of the Anaconda plant: "When one realizes that the Anacon-"When one realizes that the Anaconda company has now on hand 13,000 peunds of chemically pure arsenic, alternacy barreled and ready to ship, one can get some idea of the magnitude of the enterprise. Ordinarily there is enough arsenic manufactured at the Washoe smelter to make a big difference in the world's market.

"How do they make arsenic? Well, in the first place, the mineral is in the furness that come from the furness."

The mill is so arranged that the mineral is dumped into hoppers on the upper floor, where it is steamd and drawn out below in barrels. 
